A BILL FOR AN ACT

To make appropriations for the operations and activities of the Government of the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, its agencies, instrumentalities, and independent programs, and to provide budget authority for government corporations for Fiscal Year 2025; and for other purposes.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE 23RD NORTHERN MARIANAS COMMONWEALTH LEGISLATURE:

8	October 1, 2024 and ending September 30, 2025.

4	Section 203. Reporting Requirements for the Secretary of Finance.
5	(a) Comparison of Actual Revenues Collected and Revenues Estimated.
6	Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the Secretary of Finance shall submit to
7	the Presiding Officers of the Legislature, Chairperson of the Senate Committee on
8	Fiscal Affairs and the Chairperson of the House Committee on Ways and Means,
9	at the end of each quarter, a fund status report comparing the actual revenues
10	collected and the revenues estimated of all funds appropriated for the operations
11	and activities of the Commonwealth Government in this Act. The Secretary of
12	Finance shall meet with the Chairperson of the Senate Committee on Fiscal Affairs
13	and the Chairperson of the House Committee on Ways and Means in mid-February,
14	mid-May and mid-August to discuss actual revenues collected versus the revenues
15	estimated.
16	(b) Comparison of Actual Expenditures and Appropriated Expenditures.
17	Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the Secretary of Finance shall submit to
18	the Presiding Officers of the Legislature, Chairperson of the Senate Committee on
19	Fiscal Affairs and the Chairperson of the House Committee on Ways and Means,
20	at the end of each quarter, a fund status report comparing the actual expenditures

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1	and appropriated expenditures of all funds appropriated for the operations and
2	activities of the Commonwealth Government in this Act.
3	(c) Transfer In and Out Funds. Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the
4	Secretary of Finance shall submit to the Presiding Officers of the Legislature, at the
5	end of each quarter, a fund status report on the funds transferred in and out each
6	quarter pursuant to Section 201 of this Act.
7	(d) All Other Source. The Secretary of Finance shall report revenues in
8	excess of \$200,000.00 received from other sources that are not identified in this
9	Act.
10	(e) Violation. The salary of the Secretary of Finance shall be suspended for
l I	at least 30 days and the salary shall not be restored until the Secretary of Finance
12	provides all the reports under this section to the Presiding Officers of the
13	Legislature, Chairperson of the Senate Committee on Fiscal Affairs, and the
[4	Chairperson of the House Committee on Ways and Means. Provided that the
15	Secretary of Finance shall not be entitled to indemnification, defense, or
16	reimbursement under the Government Liability Act or any other Commonwealth
17	Law.

Section 302. Prior Certification of Funds.

No contract shall be entered into with the Commonwealth or any government entity therein without first receiving from the Secretary of the Department of Finance certification that lawful and sufficient funds have been appropriated. Notwithstanding any Commonwealth laws, regulations, or provisions to the contrary, this section shall not apply to the Judicial Branch, the Public School System, and the Northern Marianas College.

Section 303. Reporting Requirement.

In Fiscal Year 2025, the expenditure authorities of the foregoing activities listed in Section 301 and the CNMI Public School System, shall submit to the Presiding Officers of the Legislature, Chairperson of the Senate Committee on Fiscal Affairs and the Chairperson of the House Committee on Ways and Means, within 30 days at the end of each quarter, a fund status report on the expenditures for personnel and operations of each government entity, and the payments of the public auditor's fee, for the quarter ended and, if applicable, year-to-date totals as of the close of the reporting period.

Furthermore, notwithstanding any provisions or laws to the contrary, all additional resources realized within the fiscal year outside of those specified and identified under this Act shall be reported in detail to the Legislature for appropriation purposes.

1 CHAPTER IV. ADMINISTRATION OF APPROPRIATED FUNDS 2 Section 401. Management of Funds. 3 The expenditure of the funds appropriated and allocated under this Act shall be regulated and controlled by the Secretary of Finance so that no agency, 4 5 department, instrumentality, program, or activity may expend the funds contrary to 6 the law or fiscal management policies and practices of the Commonwealth. 7 Section 402. Number of Position(s) (NOP) Ceiling. 8 Employment Ceilings. Pursuant to Article X, § 7 of the Commonwealth 9 Constitution, the employment ceilings relative to the number of positions are 10 hereby established as set forth in this Act. 11 Section 403. Donation of Sick Leave. 12 Notwithstanding any laws to the contrary, when an employee volunteers to 13 donate sick leave, the donated sick leave shall be based on the donor's current base 14 hourly salary and shall be converted into equivalent sick leave hours based on the 15 recipient's current base hourly salary. Provided that the donated sick leave hours 16 shall not exceed 1040 hours. 1



Conversion.

⁽Sick Leave Hours Donated) multiplied by (Donor's Hourly Base Rate) = (Donor's Donated Dollar Value)

⁽Donor's Donated Dollar Value) divided by (Recipient's Hourly Base Rate) = (Number of Hours Donated to Recipient)

Example: (Donor donated 100 hours) x (Donor's hourly rate of \$20) = \$2,000 (\$2,000) divided by (Recipient's hourly rate of \$10) = 200 hours to Recipient.

Section 404. Expenditure Authority.

The distribution and expenditure of funds shall be in compliance with the fiscal expenditure authority that the listed agencies have pursuant to the statute and the administrative provisions of this Act.

CHAPTER V. REPROGRAMMING AUTHORITY

Section 501. Reprogramming Authority

- (a) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the Governor shall have up to 100% reprogramming authority for the departments, agencies, and offices of the executive branch, provided that the municipal entities shall not be subject to this reprogramming authority without the consent of the mayor. Provided further that the reprogramming authority shall not apply to Section 604 of this Act. Reprogramming shall not be used for the hiring of personnel or salary adjustment of active personnel. This authority to reprogram shall not apply to the funds appropriated to the Legislative or Judicial Branches as well as to those funds appropriated by the respective legislative delegations.
- (b) Pursuant to 1 CMC § 7402(e), all reprogramming shall be reported in writing to the Presiding Officers of the Legislature, the Chairperson of the House Committee on Ways and Means, and the Chairperson of the Senate Committee on Fiscal Affairs within 30 days after the end of each quarter of the fiscal year. Such reports shall include a description of each item reprogrammed, the reason for each reprogramming, the change in the approved budget caused by the reprogramming.

16	for the delivery of public services such as the Department of Public Safety and the				
17	Department of Fire and Emergency Services personnel for each respective				
18	Senatorial District and other essential positions as determined by the Governor.				
19	(b) Notwithstanding any law or regulation to the contrary, if a Notice of				
20	Personnel Action has been executed by the hiring agency or a candidate to fill the				
21	vacancy has been selected or action has been initiated to fill the position by any				

1	department or agency and filed at the Office of Personnel Management on Rota,
2	Tinian, or Saipan, the vacant position shall be considered as processed and to be
3	filled. The renewal of the contract for an existing employee shall not be considered
4	as creating a vacant position.
5	Section 603. Salary Cap.
6	(a) For Fiscal Year 2025, the compensation of certain appointed officials
7	shall be compensated as set forth in the attached Schedule A and pursuant to 1 CMC
8	§ 8245 and 1 CMC § 28003.
9	(b) For Fiscal Year 2025, notwithstanding 1 CMC § 8245(c), the annual
10	salary of the Resident Department Heads of the First and Second Senatorial
11	Districts shall be \$40,000.
12	(c) For Fiscal Year 2025, notwithstanding 1 CMC § 8245(a), the annual
13	salary of the Secretary of the Department of Lands and Natural Resources shall be
14	\$54,000.
15	(d) For Fiscal Year 2025, notwithstanding any provision of law to the
16	contrary, austerity measures shall apply to all Resident Department Heads of the
17	First and Second Senatorial Districts and CNMI Department Heads.
18	Section 604. Revolving Accounts.
19	Subject to constitutional limits, notwithstanding any CNMI and/or local
20	laws, regulations, and rules to the contrary and except for the suspended accounts
21	as provided in Section 202 and special revenue accounts, all general revolving



1	account expenditure limitations and restrictions relating to the scope of application
2	or other subject matter requirements are hereby suspended in FY 2025.
3	Accordingly, all legally established general revolving accounts and the
4	funds therein may be expended by their respective expenditure authorities for
5	personnel and the following operational expenses: fuel, communications,
6	operational office supplies, and travel for training purposes. Provided further that
7	Section 501 of this Act shall not apply to this section.
8	Section 605. <u>Legal Holidays.</u>
9	Any employee required to work on a non-federal Commonwealth legal

15	In the event of any funding shortfalls caused by this Appropriations Act, the
16	CNMI Government shall commit its full faith and credit when necessary to
17	effectuate the closure of Cell #1 and Cell #2 of the Marpi Landfill.
18	Section 607. Reduction of Work Hours.
19	During Fiscal Year 2025, notwithstanding any laws or contractual
20	provisions to the contrary, a full pay period for the employment benefit of annual

3	Section 608. Vacant Positions. Notwithstanding any law to the contrary
4	any position that becomes vacant shall be closed out. Unused funds for such
5	position shall go to operation expenses within that department or agency within 30
6	days upon vacancy unless a request is made to the Legislature for reinstatement of
7	the vacant position, which shall be approved by a joint resolution.
8	Section 609. Excepted Service Employee. The legislature recognizes that
9	there are employees who are on an Excepted Service Contract in the government
10	including the municipalities. Upon renewal of an excepted service contract, the
11	employee shall not receive a salary increase of more than ten percent.

13	Section 701. In General.
14	Funds designated in Chapter II as available for appropriation for Fiscal Year
15	2025 are hereby appropriated pursuant to this Chapter.
16	Section 702. Appropriation.
17	The amount of \$117,040,086 is hereby appropriated as set forth in the
18	attached Schedule A which is inclusive of the Department of Public Lands.
19	Section 703. <u>Judicial Branch</u> .
20	(a) The Number of Personnel and appropriations for personnel, operations
21	and utilities for the Judicial Branch shall be as shown in Schedule A.



1	(b) Funds appropriated for Fiscal Year 2025 to the Judicial Branch shall be
2	allotted on a quarterly basis, pursuant to 1 CMC § 7204(e).
3	(c) Notwithstanding any laws to the contrary, the Chief Justice of the CNMI
4	Supreme Court and Presiding Judge of the CNMI Superior Court may adjust the
5	Judicial Branch work schedule and operating hours that are consistent with
6	available funds for personnel and operations.
7	(d) The Chief Justice and the Presiding Judge may use any available outside
8	source funds, including revolving accounts, to restore the reduced work hours of
9	the Judicial Branch personnel.
10	Section 704. <u>Legislative Branch</u> .
11	The Number of Personnel and allocations for personnel, operations, and
12	utilities for the Legislative Branch shall be as shown in Schedule A.
13	(a) Art. II Sec. 16(e) of the Commonwealth Constitution provides:
14	e) Beginning the second Monday of January 1998, the amount of the
15	ceiling and all other dollar amounts stated in this section shall be
16	adjusted every two years by the same percentage as the percentage
17	change in the United States Department of Commerce composite
18	price index during the two preceding fiscal years using the
19	beginning of the fiscal year 1996 as the base.
20	The allocation ceilings have automatically increased every two years,

17	Section 705. Executive Branch.
18	The allocation for the Executive Branch shall be as shown in Schedule A.
19	(a) The Governor shall have authority to expend, obligate, encumber, or
20	otherwise commit, all the funds appropriated to the Office of the Governor and all
21	Other Offices of the Governor.

1	(b) The Lt. Governor shall be the expenditure authority of the funds
2	appropriated to the Office of the Lt. Governor.
3	(c) One NOP shall be allocated under ORG 11260900 for the Office of
4	Management and Budget.
5	(d) Funds appropriated for Fiscal Year 2025 to the Executive Branch shall
6	be allotted on a quarterly basis, pursuant to 1 CMC § 7204(e).
7	(e) Law enforcement officers of the Department of Public Safety and the
8	Department of Fire and Emergency Medical Services eligible for overtime shall be
9	funded by outside sources.
10	Section 706. First Senatorial District - Mayor of Rota and Rota
11	Municipal Council.
12	The Number of Personnel and allocations for personnel, operations, and
13	utilities for the First Senatorial District shall be as shown in Schedule A.
14	(a) Except as provided in this section, the Mayor of Rota shall have
15	authority to expend, obligate, encumber, and otherwise commit, all the funds
16	appropriated to the First Senatorial District. Appropriations to the Municipal
17	Council shall be divided and distributed equally to each member of the Municipal
18	Council in separate accounts. Each Municipal Council member shall be the
19	expenditure authority of funds distributed to him/her. Additionally, except as
20	provided in this section, in accord with the Superior Court's decision in the case of
21	Inos v. Tenorio, the Mayors shall also have expenditure authority over resident

1	government departments in the First and Second Senatorial districts respectively
2	unless the Governor revokes expenditure authority in a manner consistent with the
3	Superior Court's holding in Inos v. Tenorio, to wit: expenditure authority over
4	resident departments that are primarily concerned with the delivery of public
5	services can be revoked only on a prior showing of just cause, but the Governor has
6	the discretion to revoke expenditure authority over those departments that are
7	primarily concerned with enforcing the law.
8	(b) Any shortfall in the appropriated funds as a result or due to payment of

15	The Number of Personnel and allocations for personnel, operations, and
16	utilities for the Second Senatorial District shall be as shown in Schedule A.
17	(a) Except as provided in this section, the Mayor of Tinian and Aguiguan
18	shall have authority to expend, obligate, encumber, or otherwise commit or
19	reprogram, all the funds appropriated to the Second Senatorial District.
20	Appropriations to the Municipal Council shall be divided and distributed equally to
21	each member of the Municipal Council in separate accounts. Each Municipal



1	Council member shall be the expenditure authority of funds distributed to him/her.
2	Additionally, in accord with the Superior Court's decision in the case of <i>Inos v</i> .
3	Tenorio, the Mayors shall also have expenditure authority over resident
4	government departments in the First and Second senatorial districts respectively
5	unless the Governor revokes expenditure authority in a manner consistent with the
6	Superior Court's holding in Inos v. Tenorio, to wit: expenditure authority over
7	resident departments that are primarily concerned with the delivery of public
8	services can be revoked only on a prior showing of just cause, but the Governor has
9	the discretion to revoke expenditure authority over those departments that are
10	primarily concerned with enforcing the law.
11	(b) Any shortfall in the appropriated funds as a result or due to payment of
12	overtime, retirement, or benefits shall be borne by the municipality. Provided that
13	law enforcement officers of the Department of Public Safety - Tinian and the

20	accounts 9040 and 9044, for two Customs Inspector I positions and two Quarantine
21	Inspector I positions.



1	Section 708. Third Senatorial District - Mayor of Saipan; Mayor of the
2	Northern Islands; and Saipan and Northern Islands Municipal Council.
3	The Number of Personnel and allocations for personnel, operations, and
4	utilities for the Office of the Mayor of Saipan, Office of the Mayor of the Northern
5	Islands, and the Saipan and Northern Islands Municipal Council shall be as shown
6	in Schedule A.
7	The Mayor of Saipan, the Mayor of the Northern Islands, and the
8	Chairperson of the Municipal Council for Saipan and the Northern Islands or each
9	of their respective designees shall be the expenditure authority for allocations for
10	their respective offices.
11	Section 709. Other Programs.
12	The Fiscal Year 2025 Budget Appropriation for the programs under this
13	section shall be as shown in Schedule A.
14	(a) Northern Marianas College. The President of the Northern Marianas
15	College or designee shall be the expenditure authority of the funds under ORG
16	11881000.
17	(b) NMC Board of Regents. The Chairperson of the Board of Regents of the
18	Northern Marianas College or designee shall be the expenditure authority of the
19	appropriated funds under ORG 11882100.
20	(c) Public School System. The Commissioner of Education or designee
21	shall be the expenditure authority of the appropriated funds under ORG 11881100.



1	Funds appropriated to PSS shall not be used for the following: 1) personnel and
2	operations of the Board of Education, 2) pay raises for central administrative
3	directors until or unless all austerity measures such as teacher furloughs or other
4	curriculum/program cuts and or restrictions are rescinded or no longer in effect;
5	and 3) legal fees and costs of litigation including but not limited to any payments
6	for settlements and/or judgments. Of the appropriated funds under ORG 11881100,
7	up to \$650,000 shall be reserved for the Northern Marianas College for services
8	rendered to meet the educational needs of new graduates enrolled at the Northern
9	Marianas College. Provided further that the PSS and NMC shall enter into a
10	Memorandum of Agreement to authorize the use of these funds.

16	(e) CNMI Medical Referral Program (Health Network Program). The
17	Commonwealth Healthcare Corporation shall administer the CNMI Medical
18	Referral Program or its successor, including both inter-island and off-island
19	referrals, consistent with its duties and responsibilities under 3 CMC § 2821 et seq.
20	More specifically, the inter-island medical referral services shall include stipends
21	airfare, and lodging for patients and escorts, which is consistent with the off-island



1	medical referral program. The expenditure authority for all funds appropriated to
2	inter-island and off-island medical referral services and administration (inclusive
3	of ORG 11850100, 11850700, and any new organizations codes established for
4	CHCC Medical Referral) shall be the CEO of the Commonwealth Healthcare
5	Corporation or designee. Provided further that \$150,000 of the funds appropriated
6	to the Health Network Program, ORG 11850700, shall be used exclusively for
7	inter-island medical referral.
8	(f) Northern Marianas Technical Institute. The Chairperson of the Board of
9	Trustees or designee in consultation with the Chief Executive Officer shall be the
10	expenditure authority of the appropriated funds for the Northern Marianas
11	Technical Institute.
12	Section 710. Independent Programs.
13	The Fiscal Year 2025 Budget Appropriation for the agencies under this
14	section shall be as shown in Schedule A.
15	(a) Joeten-Kiyu Public Library. The Chairperson of the Commonwealth
16	Library Council or designee shall be the expenditure authority of the appropriated
17	funds.
18	(b) NMI Museum of History and Culture. The Chairperson of the Board of
19	Governors of the NMI Museum of History and Culture or designee shall be the
20	expenditure authority of the appropriated funds.



1	(c) Elected Attorney General. The Attorney General or designee shall be the
2	expenditure authority of the appropriated funds.
3	(d) The expenditure authority of the funds appropriated for the Public
4	Assistance Program shall be the Governor's Authorized Representative.
5	(e) Medicaid Program. The funds appropriated in this Act for the Medicaid
6	Program, including Medicaid Reimbursement, ORG 11882200, Medicaid Agency,
7	ORG 11880300, and Medicaid Enterprise Systems & Health Information
8	Technology, ORG 11850400 shall be deemed a single budget reserved for the
9	purposes of Medicaid Agency, Medicaid Reimbursement, and Medicaid Enterprise
10	Systems & Health Information Technology. The Director of the Commonwealth
11	Medicaid Agency may reallocate the funds appropriated in this Act to any of the
12	expenditure categories, including, but not limited to, Medicaid Agency, Medicaid
13	Reimbursement, and Medicaid Enterprise Systems & Health Information
14	Technology. Provided further that for the Fiscal Year 2025, pursuant to the request
15	of CNMI Medicaid, with the concurrence of the Office of Personnel Management,
16	notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, all of the 11 NOPs for the Medicaid
17	Enterprise Systems & Health Information Technology funded under ORG
18	11850400 shall be excepted service contract employees.
19	(f) CNMI Scholarship Office. Of the funds appropriated to the CNMI
20	Scholarship Office \$50,000 shall be used to fund the Professional Student
21	Exchange Program established under 3 CMC 8 11101, as shown in Schedule A

1	(g) For programs and activities not specifically mentioned, the expenditure
2	authority shall be the Secretary of Finance.
3	Section 711. Department of Public Lands.
4	Pursuant to 1 CMC § 2803 of the Commonwealth Code, Department of
5	Public Lands (DPL) submitted a budget of \$5,566,075. The Legislature however
6	acknowledges that the DPL has in its reserve account the funds for FY 2025. The
7	reserved funds shall be used by DPL in FY 2025. Therefore, as shown in Schedule
8	A, \$2 is appropriated to DPL for FY 2025 and \$5,566,073 is appropriated to the
9	Marianas Public Land Trust (MPLT). The DPL, pursuant to the Memorandum of
10	Agreement between DPL and the Department of Lands and Natural Resources
11	(DLNR) is authorized to pay for professional services provided by the personnel of
12	the DLNR Division of Parks and Recreation of all three senatorial districts.
13	Section 712. Transparency and Accurate Information Access.
14	(a) Access Provided to Legislative Fiscal Analysts.
15	Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, training and access
16	to the following shall be provided:
17	(1) The Munis Financial Management Information System or other
18	financial and accounting system to obtain the following: monthly
19	collections and expenditures, including but not limited to funds status, and
20	detailed expenditure reports in a format that is exportable or convertible to
21	Excel files; and



1	(2) The following reports in a format that is exportable or
2	convertible to Excel files shall be provided to the CNMI Legislative Fiscal
3	Analysts 30 days after the effective date of this Act:
4	(A) All revolving accounts;
5	(B) All business activities listed in Schedule A;
6	(C) All accounts listed as earmarks in the Budget Authority Act;
7	(D) All debt service payments, including payments to the Settlement
8	Fund, and Series A and Series B Funds;
9	(E) All revenue accounts in the First, Second, and Third Senatorial
10	Districts that are identified as budgetary resources in the Budget
11	Authority Act;
12	(3) Any other financial information, not legally privileged or
13	protected, relating to the CNMI Government's expenditure of public funds,
14	as needed and requested, in writing, within 10 days of said request.
15	Section 713. Violations of Spending Limits.
16	The expenditure of funds in excess of allocations and reprogramming
17	established by this Act is a violation of the Planning and Budget Act, 1 CMC §7101
18	et seq. Any expenditure authority that violates The Planning and Budget Act shall
19	be suspended without salary for at least 30 days and the salary shall not be restored
20	until a fiscal plan is submitted to the Presiding Officers of the Legislature,
21	Chairperson of the Senate Committee on Fiscal Affairs, and the Chairperson of the



1	House Committee on Ways and Means, and accepted by both houses of the
2	Legislature to retire the over-expenditure. Provided, they also shall not be entitled
3	to indemnification, defense, or reimbursement under the Government Liability Act
4	or any other Commonwealth Law.
5	CHAPTER VIII. OUTSIDE SOURCES
6	Section 801. Administrative Provisions.
7	(a) Notwithstanding 1 CMC § 7204, the outside source funds appropriated
8	for Fiscal Year 2025 shall be allotted monthly; except programs that require one-
9	time payments may receive advance allotments.
10	(b) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the Secretary of Finance shall
11	submit to the Presiding Officers of the Legislature, at the end of each quarter, a
12	fund status report on the outside-sourced funds that are transferred in and out of
13	government organizational codes and their respective accounts, pursuant to Section
14	802 of this Act.
15	(c) All salaries of elected officials that are waived under 1 CMC § 8442
16	shall be transferred by the Secretary of Finance to the Scholarship Trust Account
17	and the funds from the account shall be spent for scholarship purposes only, without
18	further appropriation, and without fiscal year limitation. The Administrator of the
19	CNMI Scholarship Office shall provide a report to the Presiding Officers of the
20	legislature within 30 days after the end of each quarter.

1 Section 802. Outside Sources. 2 (a) **Tobacco Settlement Funds**. 8 Section 902. Savings Clause. This Act and any repealer contained herein

9 shall not be construed as affecting any existing right acquired under contract or

10 acquired under statutes repealed or under any rule, regulation or order adopted

under the statutes. Repealers contained in this Act shall not affect any proceeding

12 instituted under or pursuant to prior law. The enactment of this Act shall not have

the effect of terminating, or in any way modifying, any liability civil or criminal,

which shall already be in existence at the date this Act becomes effective.

Section 903. Effective Date. This Act shall take effect upon its approval by

the Governor, or it becoming law without such approval.
