After considerable discussion, your Committee recommends that H. B. No. 23-64, be passed by the House in the form of House Substitute 1.

II. ANALYSIS:

A. Purpose:

The purpose of House Bill No. 23-64 is to authorize inmates to be paid for work they perform while imprisoned and to prepare them for successful reintegration into society.

B. House Substitute:

The Committee adopted House Bill No. 23-64 in the form of House Substitute 1 to clarify and strengthen the original intent and purpose.

C. Committee Findings:

Your Committee finds that an integral policy of the Commonwealth should be to promote the rehabilitation of inmates and aid in preparing them for successful reintegration into society. The Committee believes that one way that rehabilitation can be promoted in the Commonwealth would be to provide inmates with the opportunity to earn a wage that shall account for the work that they have performed while imprisoned. In addition, by allowing the inmates to earn a wage for the work they perform, it can aid in developing work skills, provides an opportunity for inmates to learn and engage in financial responsibility and most importantly, help build character and self-esteem. Such a policy could bring about significant change within our prison system and may potentially make a big difference in reducing recidivism and bringing down the incarceration rate.

It should be noted that not all jurisdictions in the U.S. provide inmates with the ability to earn a wage for their labor and that hourly rates paid to inmates vary widely for within the jurisdictions that do allow inmates to earn a wage for their labor. Regarding the variances between the hourly rates paid to inmates, the spectrum ranges from up to \$2.00 per hour on the high end and as little as \$0.16 per hour on the low end. Furthermore, this legislation seeks to provide the CNMI Department of Corrections with the authority to pay as much as \$1.00 per hour to the inmates.

Your Committee finds that it would be in the best interest of the Commonwealth to authorize the CNMI Department of Corrections to pay inmates for the work that they perform during their imprisonment. Furthermore, your Committee also finds that the income that inmates could potentially earn, could be applied to costs rendered by the court.

In this analysis we take a detailed look the fiscal impact that the CNMI Government could potential incur should the stipulations within HB 23-64, HS1 be implemented which would enable inmates that are incarcerated at the CNMI Department of Corrections facility to earn a wage for the labor that they have performed at a rate of \$1.00 per hour while imprisoned. During the fiscal 2025 budget hearing conducted on June 6th, 2024, by the Commonwealth's 23rd Legislature – Ways & Means Committee for the CNMI Department of Corrections (DOC), Commissioner Torres stated during his presentation, that DOC housed a total of 180 inmates at that time.

For the purpose of this analysis, a total of 180 inmates will be used to calculate the fiscal impact that the CNMI could potentially incur in the future as mentioned by Commissioner Torres during his budget hearing presentation. In addition, we must take into account variances regarding the total cost incurred by the CNMI government depending on the number of hours worked per day, the days per week worked, and the total number of weeks per year that DOC would allow for each inmate. Furthermore, we must also take into account the number or percentage of the 180 inmates housed at the DOC facility.

As an example, we could use an event performed by the employees at the Saipan Mayor's Office where they would conduct the cleaning of secondary roads. In this event, the average hourly salary of the 24 community workers currently working at the Saipan Mayor's comes out to roughly \$13.08. In the event that the Mayor's Office would substitute the labor of their employees with the labor of inmates, the Mayor's Office could realize a cost saving measure of \$12.08 per hour that is substituted with the labor of an inmate.

On the other hand, inmate labor could be used in the event of a private company such as Hawaiian Rock substituting the labor of their workforce for the labor of inmates for specific projects that they could have the inmates perform. If we take into account the average hourly salary of an employee at Hawaiian Rock to be at \$10 an hour, substituting their employees labor for the labor of an inmate would save their company \$9 per employee for the number of hours that the employee would work to have a specific project completed.

While conducting calculations, the variables pertaining to the number of hours, days and weeks per year that are worked for an inmate shall be controlled and remain consistent in each calculation. On the other hand, the variable pertaining to the number or percentage of inmates that are eligible to earn a wage for their worked performed will differ signifying both the low end and high end of the fiscal impact the CNMI Government could incur in the future. In total there will be two separate calculations that will be conducted.

Section 5. Savings Clause. This Act and any repealer contained herein shall not be construed as affecting any existing right acquired under contract or acquired under statutes repealed or under any rule, regulation or order adopted under the statutes. Repealers contained in this Act shall not affect any proceeding instituted under or pursuant to prior law. The enactment of this Act shall not have the effect of terminating, or in any way modifying, any liability civil or criminal, which shall already be in existence at the date this Act becomes effective.
