#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

To make appropriations for the operations and activities of the Government of the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, its agencies, instrumentalities, and independent programs, and to provide budget authority for government corporations for Fiscal Year 2025; and for other purposes.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE 23<sup>RD</sup> NORTHERN MARIANAS COMMONWEALTH LEGISLATURE:

1	CHAPTER 1. PRELIMINARY PROVISIONS.
2	Section 101. Short Title. This Act may be cited as the "Appropriations and
3	Budget Authority Act of 2025".
4	Section 102. Purpose. This Act appropriates local funds for the operations
5	and activities of the Government of the Northern Mariana Islands, its agencies,
6	instrumentalities, independent agencies and political subdivisions, and provides
7	authority for government corporations for Fiscal Year 2025 commencing
8	October 1, 2024 and ending September 30, 2025.

In Fiscal Year 2025, within 30 days of the end of 15 each quarter, the Secretary of Finance shall submit financial records covering all 16 quarterly allotments for all local and federal funds for the CNMI Public School 17 System, Department of Labor for Contract Workers fees, Northern Marianas 18 Technical Institute, Commonwealth Healthcare Corporation, Northern Marianas 19 College, and Marianas Visitors Authority to the Presiding Officers of the 20 Legislature, Chairperson of the Senate Committee on Fiscal Affairs and the 21 Chairperson of the House Committee on Ways and Means.

1 Notwithstanding the above dollar amounts, the entities above shall expend 2 only the lesser of funds actually generated, collected, or received, or the amounts 3 indicated above. 4 Section 302. Prior Certification of Funds. 5 No contract shall be entered into with the Commonwealth or any government entity therein without first receiving from the Secretary of the 6 7 Department of Finance certification that lawful and sufficient funds have been 8 appropriated. Notwithstanding any Commonwealth laws, regulations, or provisions 9 to the contrary, this section shall not apply to the Judicial Branch, the Public School 10 System, and the Northern Marianas College. 11 Section 303. Reporting Requirement. 12 The expenditure authorities of the foregoing activities listed in Section 301 13 shall submit to the Presiding Officers of the Legislature, at the end of each quarter, 14 a fund status report on the expenditures for personnel and operations of each 15 government entity, and the payments of the public auditor's fee, for the quarter 16 ended and, if applicable, year-to-date totals as of the close of the reporting period. 17 Furthermore, notwithstanding any provisions or laws to the contrary, all 18 additional resources realized within the fiscal year outside of those specified and 19 identified under this Act shall be reported in detail to the Legislature for 20 appropriation purposes.

CHAPTER IV. ADMINISTRATION OF APPROPRIATED FUNDS

1	Section 401. Management of Funds.
2	The expenditure of the funds appropriated and allocated under this Act shall
3	be regulated and controlled by the Secretary of Finance so that no agency,
4	department, instrumentality, program, or activity may expend the funds contrary to
5	the law or fiscal management policies and practices of the Commonwealth.
6	Provided further that, in addition to the report required under 1 CMC § 7209, the
7	Secretary of Finance shall submit within 30 calendar days at the end of each quarter,
8	a fund status report on the expenditures for personnel and operations of each
9	business unit funded in whole or in part by the General Fund for the quarter ended
10	and, if applicable, year-to-date totals as of the close of the reporting period.
11	Section 402. Number of Position(s) (NOP) Ceiling.
12	Employment Ceilings. Pursuant to Article X, § 7 of the Commonwealth
13	Constitution, the employment ceilings relative to the number of positions are
14	hereby established as set forth in this Act.
15	Section 403. <u>Donation of Sick Leave.</u>
16	Notwithstanding any laws to the contrary, when an employee volunteers to
17	donate sick leave, the donated sick leave shall be donated and utilized on a one to
18	one basis, regardless of salary, and not based on any other computation. Provided
18 19	one basis, regardless of salary, and not based on any other computation. Provided that the donated sick leave hours shall not exceed 1040 hours.

The distribution and expenditure of funds shall be in compliance with the fiscal expenditure authority that the listed agencies have pursuant to the statute and the administrative provisions of this Act.

#### CHAPTER V. REPROGRAMMING AUTHORITY

#### Section 501. Reprogramming Authority

- (a) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the Governor shall have up to 100% reprogramming authority for the departments, agencies, and offices of the executive branch, provided that the municipal entities shall not be subject to this reprogramming authority without the consent of the mayor. Provided further that the reprogramming authority shall not apply to Section 604 of this Act. Reprogramming shall not be used for the hiring of personnel or salary adjustment of active personnel. This authority to reprogram shall not apply to the funds appropriated to the Legislative or Judicial Branches as well as to those funds appropriated by the respective legislative delegations.

Such reports shall include a description of each item reprogrammed, the reason for each reprogramming, the change in the approved budget caused by the reprogramming, the cumulative amount of all reprogramming during the fiscal year, and such other

12	Finance for timely payment.
13	Section 602. Hiring Restriction.
14	(a) Except as provided in subsection (b) of this section and Section 706(b).
15	no new or vacant position shall be filled in the executive branch, except for
16	positions that are essential for the delivery of public services such as the
17	Department of Public Safety and the Department of Fire and Emergency Services
8	personnel for each respective Senatorial District and other essential positions as
19	determined by the Governor.
20	(b) Notwithstanding any law or regulation to the contrary, if a Notice of
21	Personnel Action has been executed by the hiring agency or a candidate to fill the

1 vacancy has been selected or action has been initiated to fill the position by any 2 department or agency and filed at the Office of Personnel Management on Rota, 3 Tinian, or Saipan, the vacant position shall be considered as processed and to be 4 filled. The renewal of the contract for an existing employee shall not be considered 5 as creating a vacant position. 6 Section 603. Salary Cap. 7 (a) For Fiscal Year 2025, the compensation of certain appointed officials 8 shall be compensated as set forth in the attached Schedule A and pursuant to 1 CMC 9 § 8245 and 1 CMC § 28003. 10 (b) For Fiscal Year 2025, notwithstanding 1 CMC § 8245(c), the annual 11 salary of the Resident Department Heads of the First and Second Senatorial 12 Districts shall not exceed \$40,000 as set forth in the attached Schedule A. 13 Section 604. Revolving Accounts. 14 Subject to constitutional limits, notwithstanding any CNMI and/or local 15 laws, regulations, and rules to the contrary and except for the suspended accounts 16 as provided in Section 202 and special revenue accounts, all general revolving 17 account expenditure limitations and restrictions relating to the scope of application 18 or other subject matter requirements are hereby suspended in FY 2025. 19 Accordingly, all legally established general revolving accounts, except 20 accounts 9040 and 9044, and the funds therein may be expended by their respective 21 expenditure authorities for the following personnel and operational expenses: fuel.

14	In the event of any funding shortfalls caused by this Appropriations Act, the

6	exceed \$7,557,000.00, that are necessary to effectuate the closure of Cell #1 of the
7	Marpi Landfill.
8	Section 608. Reduction of Work Hours.
9	During Fiscal Year 2025, notwithstanding any laws or contractual
20	provisions to the contrary, a full pay period for purposes of earning annual leave,
1	sick leave, or other benefits, shall be 80 hours less the amount of hours deducted

1	via austerity measures. This provision shall not apply to first responders and law
2	enforcement personnel whose normal work exceeds 80 hours per pay period.

13	(b) Notwithstanding 1 CMC § 7204 (e), funds appropriated for
14	Fiscal Year 2025 to the Judicial Branch shall be allotted monthly. Provided that the
15	allotment request for the last month of the fiscal year shall be made no later than
16	August 1st and the requested advance shall be remitted on or before August 15th.
17	(c) Notwithstanding any laws to the contrary, the Chief Justice of the CNMI
18	Supreme Court and Presiding Judge of the CNMI Superior Court may adjust the
19	Judicial Branch work schedule and operating hours that are consistent with
20	available funds for personnel and operations.

1	(d) The Chief Justice and the Presiding Judge may use any available outside
2	source funds, including revolving accounts, to restore the reduced work hours of
3	the Judicial Branch personnel.
4	(e) Notwithstanding any law, rule, or provision to the contrary, the
5	expenditure of any funds appropriated herein or obtained from outside sources, that
6	is directly or indirectly related to judges pro tempore or justices pro tempore is
7	strictly prohibited. Said prohibited expenditures shall include but not be limited to:
8	salaries or other forms of compensation, travel costs inclusive of airfare, hotel
9	accommodations, rental cars, per diems, incidental costs or fees, and
10	reimbursements.
11	Section 704. <u>Legislative Branch</u> .
12	The Number of Personnel and allocations for personnel, operations, and
13	utilities for the Legislative Branch shall be as shown in Schedule A.
14	(a) Art. II Sec. 16(e) of the Commonwealth Constitution provides:
15	e) Beginning the second Monday of January 1998, the amount of the
16	ceiling and all other dollar amounts stated in this section shall be
17	adjusted every two years by the same percentage as the percentage
18	change in the United States Department of Commerce composite
19	price index during the two preceding fiscal years using the

1	The allocation ceilings have automatically increased every two years,

15	legislative business; provided that a member may receive a one-month
16	advancement of funds appropriated to his or her office for expenditures;
17	(3) Allocation of the maximum number of positions among House
18	members shall be governed by the rules of the House; and
19	(4) Allocation of the maximum number of positions among Senate
20	members shall be governed by the rules of the Senate.

1	(g) Senate and House Leadership Accounts. The leadership account of each
2	house shall be \$100,000. The Presiding Officer of each respective house, or his
3	lawfully authorized designee, shall be the expenditure authority and shall use such
4	funds to support the operations and activities of the House of Representatives and
5	Senate in accordance with its rules, provided that the Presiding Officer distributes
6	a portion of the total allocation in equal amounts to all the standing committees for
7	their operations and activities.

12	designee. Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, the expenditure authority
13	for the Legislative Bureau shall have reprogramming authority to move funding
14	from Personnel to Operations.
15	(i) Northern Marianas Youth Congress, ORG 11620800. The Number of
16	Personnel and allocations for personnel and operations for Youth Congress shall be
17	as shown in Schedule A. The expenditure authority is vested in the Director of the
18	Legislative Bureau with the consent of the Speaker of the Northern Mariana Islands

20	Section 705. Executive Branch.
21	The allocation for the Executive Branch shall be as shown in Schedule A.

1	(a) The Governor shall have authority to expend, obligate, encumber, or
2	otherwise commit, all the funds appropriated to the Office of the Governor and all
3	Other Offices of the Governor.

4 (b) The Lt. Governor shall be the expenditure authority of the funds
5 appropriated to the Office of the Lt. Governor.

# Section 706. <u>First Senatorial District – Mayor of Rota and Rota</u> Municipal Council.

The Number of Personnel and allocations for personnel, operations, and utilities for the First Senatorial District shall be as shown in Schedule A.

(a) Except as provided in this section, the Mayor of Rota shall have authority to expend, obligate, encumber, and otherwise commit, all the funds appropriated to the First Senatorial District. Appropriations to the Municipal Council shall be divided and distributed equally to each member of the Municipal Council in separate accounts. Each Municipal Council member shall be the expenditure authority of funds distributed to him/her. Additionally, except as provided in this section, in accord with the Superior Court's decision in the case of *Inos v. Tenorio*, the Mayors shall also have expenditure authority over resident government departments in the First and Second Senatorial districts respectively unless the Governor revokes expenditure authority in a manner consistent with the Superior Court's holding in *Inos v. Tenorio*, to wit: expenditure authority over resident departments that are primarily concerned with the delivery of public

1	services can be revoked only on a prior showing of just cause, but the Governor has
2	the discretion to revoke expenditure authority over those departments that are
3	primarily concerned with enforcing the law.
4	(b) Any shortfall in the appropriated funds as a result or due to payment of
5	overtime, retirement, or benefits shall be borne by the municipality.
6	(c) The Secretary of Finance shall remit to the respective municipal
7	treasurer all funds relating to the salaries of all municipal employees that are funded
8	by this Act on the first day of each month.
9	Section 707. Second Senatorial District - Mayor of Tinian & Aguiguan
10	and Tinian Municipal Council.
11	The Number of Personnel and allocations for personnel, operations, and
12	utilities for the Second Senatorial District shall be as shown in Schedule A.
13	(a) Except as provided in this section, the Mayor of Tinian and Aguiguan
14	shall have authority to expend, obligate, encumber, or otherwise commit or
15	reprogram, all the funds appropriated to the Second Senatorial District.
16	Appropriations to the Municipal Council shall be divided and distributed equally to
17	each member of the Municipal Council in separate accounts. Each Municipal
18	Council member shall be the expenditure authority of funds distributed to him/her.
19	Additionally, in accord with the Superior Court's decision in the case of Inos v.
20	Tenorio, the Mayors shall also have expenditure authority over resident
21	government departments in the First and Second senatorial districts respectively

1	unless the Governor revokes expenditure authority in a manner consistent with the
2	Superior Court's holding in Inos v. Tenorio, to wit: expenditure authority over
3	resident departments that are primarily concerned with the delivery of public
4	services can be revoked only on a prior showing of just cause, but the Governor has
5	the discretion to revoke expenditure authority over those departments that are
6	primarily concerned with enforcing the law.
7	(b) Any shortfall in the appropriated funds as a result or due to payment of
8	overtime, retirement, or benefits shall be borne by the municipality.
9	(c) The Secretary of Finance shall remit to the respective municipal
0	treasurer all funds relating to the salaries of all municipal employees that are funded
1	by this Act on the first day of each month.
2	Section 708. Third Senatorial District - Mayor of Saipan; Mayor of the
3	Northern Islands; and Saipan and Northern Islands Municipal Council.
4	The Number of Personnel and allocations for personnel, operations, and
5	utilities for the Office of the Mayor of Saipan, Office of the Mayor of the Northern
6	Islands, and the Saipan and Northern Islands Municipal Council shall be as shown
7	in Schedule A.
8	The Mayor of Saipan, the Mayor of the Northern Islands, and the
9	Chairperson of the Municipal Council for Saipan and the Northern Islands or each
0	of their respective designees shall be the expenditure authority for allocations for
1	their respective offices.

1	Section 709. Other Programs.
2	The Fiscal Year 2025 Budget Appropriation for the programs under this
3	section shall be as shown in Schedule A.
4	(a) Northern Marianas College. The President of the Northern Marianas
5	College or designee shall be the expenditure authority of the funds under ORG
6	11881000.
7	(b) NMC Board of Regents. The Chairperson of the Board of Regents of the
8	Northern Marianas College or designee shall be the expenditure authority of the
9	appropriated funds under ORG 11882100.
10	(c) Public School System. The Commissioner of Education or designee
11	shall be the expenditure authority of the appropriated funds under ORG 11881100.
12	Funds appropriated to PSS shall not be used for the following: 1) personnel and
13	operations of the Board of Education, 2) pay raises for central administrative
14	directors until or unless all austerity measures such as teacher furloughs or other
15	curriculum/program cuts and or restrictions are rescinded or no longer in effect; 3)
16	legal fees and costs of litigation including but not limited to any payments for
17	settlements and/or judgments.
18	(d) Board of Education. The Chairperson of the Board of Education or
19	his/her designee shall be the expenditure authority of the appropriated funds under
20	ORG 11882000. The funds appropriated to the Board of Education shall include

1 the cost and expenses of the student and teacher representatives to the Board of 2 Education. 3 (e) CNMI Medical Referral Program (Health Network Program). The Commonwealth Healthcare Corporation shall administer the CNMI Medical 4 5 Referral Program or its successor, including both inter-island and off-island referrals, consistent with its duties and responsibilities under 3 CMC § 2821 et seq. 6 7 More specifically, the inter-island medical referral services shall include stipends, airfare, and lodging for patients and escorts, which is consistent with the off-island 8 9 medical referral program. The expenditure authority for all funds appropriated to 10 inter-island and off-island medical referral services and administration (inclusive 11 of ORG 11850100, 11850700, and any new organizations codes established for 12 CHCC Medical Referral shall be the CEO of the Commonwealth Healthcare 13 Corporation or designee. Provided further that \$150,000 of the funds appropriated to the Health Network Program, ORG 11850700, shall be used exclusively for 14 15 inter-island medical referral. 16 (f) Northern Marianas Technical Institute. The Chairperson of the Board of 17 Trustees or designee in consultation with the Chief Executive Officer shall be the 18 expenditure authority of the appropriated funds for the Northern Marianas

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Technical Institute.

1	Section 710. <u>Independent Programs</u> .
2	The Fiscal Year 2025 Budget Appropriation for the agencies under this
3	section shall be as shown in Schedule A.
4	(a) Joeten-Kiyu Public Library. The Chairperson of the Commonwealth
5	Library Council or designee shall be the expenditure authority of the appropriated
6	funds.
7	(b) NMI Museum of History and Culture. The Chairperson of the Board of
8	Governors of the NMI Museum of History and Culture or designee shall be the
9	expenditure authority of the appropriated funds.
10	(c) Elected Attorney General. The Attorney General or designee shall be the
11	expenditure authority of the appropriated funds.
12	(d) The expenditure authority of the funds appropriated for the Public
13	Assistance Program shall be the Governor's Authorized Representative.
14	(e) Medicaid Program. The funds appropriated in this Act for the Medicaid
15	Program, including Medicaid Reimbursement, ORG 11882200, Medicaid Agency,
16	ORG 11880300, and Medicaid Enterprise Systems & Health Information
17	Technology, ORG 11850400 shall be deemed a single budget reserved for the
18	purposes of Medicaid Agency, Medicaid Reimbursement, and Medicaid Enterprise
19	Systems & Health Information Technology.
20	(f) For programs and activities not specifically mentioned, the expenditure
21	authority shall be the Secretary of Finance.

#### Section 711. Department of Public Lands.

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2 Pursuant to 1 CMC § 2803 of the Commonwealth Code, \$5,566,075 is 3 appropriated to the Department of Public Lands. In addition to the 81 NOPs set 4 forth in Schedule A allotted to the Department of Public Lands (DPL) inclusive of 5 the Saipan-based NOPs assigned to DLNR's Division of Parks and Recreation 6 pursuant to the Memorandum of Agreement between DPL and the Department of 7 Lands and Natural Resources (DLNR). DPL shall also assume fifty percent (50%) 8 personnel obligations associated with seven (7) existing and current NOPs with the 9 funds appropriated to DPL. These seven (7) NOPs shall consist of four (4) NOPs for the Division of Parks and Recreation Rota and three (3) NOPs for the Division 10 11 of Parks and Recreation Tinian, provided further, these NOPs shall remain assigned 12 to DLNR Division of Parks and Recreation.

#### Section 712. Reporting Requirements.

(a) The expenditure authorities of the foregoing activities listed in Chapter VII shall submit to the Presiding Officers of the Legislature, within 30 days after the end of each quarter, a fund status report on the expenditures for personnel and operations of each government entity, and the payments of the public auditor's fee, for the quarter ended and, if applicable, year-to-date totals as of the close of the reporting period. Failure to report on the expenditures of such funds by each respective government entity shall result in a suspension of their future allocations

1	until the delayed quarterly report has been submitted to the Presiding Officers of
2	the Legislature.
3	(b) Access Provided to Legislative Fiscal Analysts.
4	Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, training and access
5	to the following shall be provided:
6	(A) the Munis Financial Management Information System or other
7	financial and accounting system to obtain the following: monthly
8	collections and expenditures, including but not limited to funds status, and
9	detailed expenditure reports in a format that is exportable or convertible to
10	Excel files; and
11	(B) the following reports in a format that is exportable or convertible
12	to Excel files shall be provided to the CNMI Legislative Fiscal Analysts 30
13	days after the effective date of this Act:
14	(i) All revolving accounts;
15	(ii) All business activities listed in Schedule A;
16	(iii) All accounts listed as earmarks in the Budget Authority
17	Act;
18	(iv) All debt service payments, including payments to the
19	Settlement Fund, and Series A and Series B Funds;

1	(v) All revenue accounts in the First, Second, and Third
2	Senatorial Districts that are identified as budgetary resources in the
3	Budget Authority Act;
4	(C) Any other financial information, not legally privileged or
5	protected, relating to the CNMI Government's expenditure of public funds,
6	as needed and requested, in writing, within 10 days of said request.
7	Section 713. Violations of Spending Limits.
8	The expenditure of funds in excess of allocations and reprogramming
9	established by this Act is a violation of the Planning and Budget Act, 1 CMC §7101
0	et seq. Any expenditure authority that violates The Planning and Budget Act shall
1	be suspended without salary for at least 30 days and the salary shall not be restored
2	until a fiscal plan is submitted to the Presiding Officers of the Legislature,
3	Chairperson of the Senate Committee on Fiscal Affairs, and the Chairperson of the
4	House Committee on Ways and Means, and accepted by both houses of the
5	Legislature to retire the over-expenditure. Provided, they also shall not be entitled
6	to indemnification, defense, or reimbursement under the Government Liability Act
7	or any other Commonwealth Law.
8	CHAPTER VIII. OUTSIDE SOURCES
9	Section 801 Administrative Provisions

1	(a) Notwithstanding 1 CMC § 7204, the outside source funds appropriated
2	for Fiscal Year 2025 shall be allotted monthly; except programs that require one-
3	time payments may receive advance allotments.
4	(b) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the Secretary of Finance shall
5	submit to the Presiding Officers of the Legislature, at the end of each quarter, a
6	fund status report on the outside-sourced funds that are transferred in and out of
7	government organizational codes and their respective accounts, pursuant to Section
8	802 of this Act.
9	(c) All salaries of elected officials that are waived under 1 CMC § 8442
10	shall be transferred by the Secretary of Finance to the Scholarship Trust Account
11	and the funds from the account shall be spent for scholarship purposes only, without
12	further appropriation, and without fiscal year limitation. The Administrator of the
13	CNMI Scholarship Office shall provide a report to the Presiding Officers of the
14	legislature within 30 days after the end of each quarter.
15	Section 802. Outside Sources.
16	(a) Tobacco Settlement Funds. Pursuant to 3 CMC § 2173 and the funds
17	allocated in this section pursuant to the submittal of a program and expenditure plan
18	to the Secretary of Finance, the Tobacco Settlement funds in the amount of
19	\$541,597.00, not subject to reprogramming or fiscal year limitation, shall be
20	allocated as follows:

(1) Division of Public Health 40%: \$216,638.80
(2) Public School System 20%: \$108,319.40
(3) Youth Affairs Office 12.5%: \$67,699.62
(4) Coalition of Private Schools 7.5%: \$40,619.78
(5) Rota Mayor 10%: \$54,159.70
(6) Tinian and Aguiguan Mayor 10%: \$54,159.70
The expenditure authorities of the funds allocated pursuant to this
Section 802(a) shall be the persons authorized by law for each respective office or
agency. The expenditure authorities shall provide accountability and transparency
by providing within 30 days after the end of each quarter an expenditure report of
the funds to the governor and the Presiding Officers of the Legislature.
(b) Commonwealth Worker Fund (Source: U.S.P.L. 115-218).
In accordance with U.S. Public Law 115-218, the sum of \$1,300,000.00 in
Commonwealth Worker Fee Funds shall be available for the sole and exclusive
purpose of funding vocational education, apprenticeships, or other training
programs for United States workers by Commonwealth educational entities for
Fiscal Year 2025. Provided that out of the \$1,300,000.00, the following amounts
shall be allocated for the sole and exclusive purpose of funding vocational
education, apprenticeships, or other vocational training programs for United States

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workers.

7	(1) The expenditure authorities of all Commonwealth educational

10	on Fiscal Affairs and the Chairperson of the House Committee on Ways and
11	Means, at the end of each quarter, a fund status report of the funds allocated
12	under this subsection.
13	(2) The recipients of the funds in this subsection shall submit to the
14	Governor and the Department of Labor the required education plans
15	consistent with and mandated by U.S. Public Law 115-218. The funds
16	allocated pursuant to this subsection shall not be used or reprogrammed for
17	any other purpose other than in accordance with U.S. Public Law 115-218.
18	The funds allocated under this subsection are not subject to fiscal year
19	limitation.
