AN ACT

TO ADDRESS PUBLIC CORRUPTION BY EXPANDING AND
CLARIFYING THE OFFENSE OF OFFICIAL MISCONDUCT
AND ESTABLISHING FELONY AND MISDEMEANOR
PUNISHMENTS; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

**BE IT ENACTED BY THE TWENTY-THIRD NORTHERN
MARIANAS COMMONWEALTH LEGISLATURE:**

1 **SECTION 1. FINDINGS AND PURPOSES.**

2 The Legislature finds that public service is a privilege entrusted to certain individuals,
3 commonly referred to as public servants and/or public officials, to provide service to all
4 members of the community. Cognizant of such an honorable privilege, these individuals,
5 whether elected or appointed, are regarded in high esteem as they are intended to serve for the
6 common good of the general population. The Legislature further finds that as public
7 servants/public officials, they must be held to a standard commensurate to the high esteem in
8 which they are held.

HOUSE BILL 23-15, HS1

1 This legislation provides an expanded and clarified definition of official misconduct
2 and assigns specific felony and misdemeanor punishments, depending on the type of
3 underlying misconduct. As the CNMI Supreme Court has noted, the Penal Code does not
4 expressly define who is a “public official” for the offense of official misconduct, making it
5 subject to some interpretation. CNMI v. Kaipat, 2 N.M.I 322 (SC 1991) (discussing whether
6 police officer is a public official in the absence of statutory definition). This bill defines the
7 phrase by referencing the statutory definition of “public servant” in the Penal Code. This bill
8 also enhances the punishments associated with the crime of misconduct in public office by
9 applying felony punishment ranges to the most serious acts of misconduct and the loss of
10 substantial amounts of public funds.

11 **SECTION 2. AMENDMENT.**

12 Title 6 CMC Section 103 (l) of the Commonwealth Code is hereby amended as follows:

13 (l) “Public servant” means any elected or appointed official, employee, or
14 authorized agent of any branch, department, agency, public authorized corporation,
15 association, commission, council or other instrumentality of the Commonwealth
16 government; including mayors, legislators and judges, and any person acting as an
17 advisor, consultant or otherwise, in performing a governmental function. The term
18 “public servant” does not include witnesses.

19 **SECTION 3. AMENDMENT.**

20 Title 6 CMC Section 3202 of the Commonwealth Code is hereby amended as follows:

21 **“§ 3202. Misconduct in Public Office.**

22 (a) “Public official” means any public servant.

HOUSE BILL 23-15, HS1

1 (b) A person, being a public official, commits the offense of misconduct in
2 public office if the person:

3 (1) does any illegal act under the color of office, or

4 (2) knowingly neglects to perform the duties of the person's office as provided
5 by any law, including any constitution, statute, regulation or rule.

6 (c) A conviction under subsection (b)(1) is punishable by imprisonment for not
7 more than 10 years and a fine of not more than \$50,000 if the illegal act was a felony
8 offense.

9 (d) A conviction under subsection (b)(1) is punishable by imprisonment for not
10 more than 2 years and a fine of not more than \$1,500 if the illegal act was a
11 misdemeanor.

12 (e) A conviction under subsection (b)(1) is punishable by imprisonment for not
13 more than 1 year or a fine of not more than \$1,000, or both if the illegal act was not a
14 criminal offense.

15 (f) A conviction under subsection (b)(2) is punishable by imprisonment for not
16 more than 10 years and a fine of not more than \$50,000 if the neglect resulted in the
17 total illegal expenditure of \$100,000 or more.

18 (g) A conviction under subsection (b)(2) is punishable by not more than 2 years
19 and a fine of not more than \$1,500 if the neglect resulted in the total illegal expenditure
20 of less than \$100,000.

21 (h) A conviction under subsection (b)(2) is punishable by imprisonment for not
22 more than 1 year or a fine of not more than \$1,000 or both if the neglect did not result

1 in any illegal expenditure or the amount of the illegal expenditure cannot be
2 determined.

3 (i) The court shall order any sentence of imprisonment for this offense to run
4 consecutive to any other sentence imposed that arose from the same criminal
5 transaction.”

6 **SECTION 4. SEVERABILITY.**

7 If any provisions of this Act or the application of any such provision to any person or
8 circumstance should be held invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this
9 Act or the application of its provisions to persons or circumstances other than those to which
10 it is held invalid shall not be affected thereby.

11 **SECTION 5. SAVINGS CLAUSE.**


12 This Act and any repealer contained herein shall not be construed as affecting any
13 existing right acquired under contract or acquired under statutes repealed or under any rule,
14 regulation, or order adopted under the statutes. Repealers contained in this Act shall not affect
15 any proceeding instituted under or pursuant to prior law. The enactment of the Act shall not
16 have the effect of terminating, or in any way modifying, any liability, civil or criminal, which
17 shall already be in existence on the date this Act becomes effective.


SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Act shall take effect upon its approval by the Governor, or it becoming law without such approval.


