A LOCAL BILL FOR AN ACT

To ban the use of plastic checkout bags in the Second Senatorial District; and for other purposes.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE TINIAN AND AGUIGUAN LEGISLATIVE DELEGATION PURSUANT TO CHAPTER 4, DIVISION 1, TITLE 1 OF THE COMMONWEALTH CODE:

Section 1. Short Title. This Act may be cited as the "Tinian Municipality Think 1 2 Green Act of 2022".

Section 2. Findings and Purpose. The Tinian and Aguiguan Legislative 3 4 Delegation (Delegation) finds that discarded non-compostable plastic bags pollute the 5 environment and pose a significant threat to terrestrial and marine animals. In addition to 6 the harm these plastic bags present, the manufacturing of these bags requires the needless 7 consumption of the earth's ever-depleting non-renewable resources.

8 According to the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), an estimated 5 9 trillion plastic bags are used worldwide each year. This data amounts to over nine million bags per minute. Billions of these bags end up as litter each year on our land and ocean. The 10 Delegation finds that hundreds of thousands of sea animals die every year from eating 11 12 discarded plastic bags mistaken for food with roughly forty-six thousand types of plastic are found floating in every square mile of the ocean. 13

The Delegation also finds that plastic bags are most harmful because rather than 14 biodegrade, they photodegrade – that is, they break down into smaller and smaller toxic 15 bits. These poisonous materials eventually contaminate the soil and waterways and enter 16 the food chain when animals accidentally ingest them. A single plastic bag can take up to 17 1,000 years to degrade and still remain toxic even after they break down. 18

1 This Act is one avenue for an island-wide effort to assist our global neighbors in 2 reversing global warming and greenhouse effects that threaten to harm our environment 3 and the welfare of all the earth's present and future inhabitants. Although recognizing that 4 the changes mandated herein may be considered inconvenient and costly, the Delegation 5 finds that the alternative of doing nothing, of standing idly by, is unacceptable. Moreover, 6 the measures taken today are not unprecedented and have been successful in other parts of 7 the world. Governments around the world are considering implementing similar measures. 8 In fact, thirty-four countries in Africa alone have already banned single-use plastics. More 9 than 120 companies and hundreds of civil society organizations have also backed calls for 10 a global treaty to end plastic waste.

11 Furthermore, consumers are becoming environmentally cognizant of the use of eco-12 friendly packaging and the universal effort of the "go-green" movement. Through the 13 initiative of using environment friendly bags, each resident is playing an integral part in 14 lessening the harmful release of chemicals and toxins and taking a proactive step in 15 safeguarding the natural resources of Tinian. As temporary residents of this earth, and 16 particularly as stewards of the island of Tinian and the Commonwealth, we have a duty to 17 preserve our resources and act as guardians of mother earth for the benefit of our children, 18 their children, and the future generations. We must no longer overlook issues relating to 19 consumption and the impact, both economically and environmentally, associated with the 20 use of plastic bags.

The Delegation recognizes the collaborative efforts with department heads, agencies, and members of the Tinian Leadership over the years for the unwavering support for the Zero Waste Management Campaign on Tinian. Therefore, as part of the continued proactive measures for the residents of Tinian, it is the intent of this legislation to ban the use of plastic checkout bags in the Second Senatorial District.

Section 3. <u>Enactment.</u> Subject to codification by the Commonwealth Law
Revision Commission, the following provisions are hereby enacted under Division 2, Title
10 of the Commonwealth Code:

1 "Chapter XX. Tinian Municipality Think Green Act of 2022. 2 § 101. Definition. For the purposes of this chapter: (a) "Environment friendly bag" or "eco-friendly bag" means a bag specifically 3 4 designed and manufactured for multiple reuse and is made of biodegradable material, cloth, 5 fiber, or other machine washable fabric; б (b) "Plastic checkout bag" means any bag that is provided to a consumer by a retail 7 or wholesale establishment at the point of sale to carry purchases. A plastic checkout bag 8 shall not include any of the following: 9 (1) A bag provided to the consumer for use in a retail or wholesale 10 establishment to package bulk items, such as fruits, vegetables, nuts, grains, candy, 11 meats, poultry, or fish; 12 (2) A bag to contain or wrap potted plants or other items where dampness 13 may be a problem; 14 (3) A bag to contain non-prepackaged food items or bakery goods; 15 (4) Bags sold in packages containing multiple bags intended for garbage, 16 pet waste, or yard waste; and 17 (5) A bag used to package frozen items. 18 (c) "Program" means the Municipality's Recycling Program spearheaded under the 19 Office of the Mayor of Tinian and Aguiguan as part of the municipality's Zero-Waste 20 Management Campaign; 21 (d) "Retail establishment" means any entity that engages in the business of selling 22 tangible property to others for consumption or use by the purchaser, and not or resale; and 23 (e) "Wholesale establishment" means any entity that engages in the business of 24 selling tangible property for the purpose of resale. 25 § 102. Prohibition on the Distribution and Use of Plastic Checkout Bags. Beginning January 1, 2023, all retail or wholesale establishments with a valid 26 27 business license issued by the Department of Finance are prohibited from purchasing, 28 selling, or distributing plastic checkout bags as defined under § 101(a) in the Second 1 Senatorial District of Tinian and Aguiguan.

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§ 103. Sale, Distribution, or Use of Environment Friendly Bags.

3 Beginning January 1, 2023, retail or wholesale establishments may offer for sale or 4 distribute environment friendly bags to consumers. Alternatively, consumers are permitted 5 to use personally owned eco-friendly bags to carry out purchases.

§ 104. Enforcement.

7 The Department of Commerce-Tinian enforcement division shall have the right to 8 conduct inspections and issue fines to retail or business establishments without prior notice 9 during the business establishment's regular business hours. During such an inspection, the 10 Department of Commerce-Tinian shall have the right to visit every part of the premises to 11 ensure compliance with this Act.

12 § 105. Penalties.

13 (a) Any retail or wholesale establishment violating any part of this Act shall be subject to a civil fine of not less than \$50 and no more than \$500 for each day a violation 14 15 occurs.

(b) All fines collected pursuant to this section shall be paid to the Tinian Municipal 16 Treasurer. Such fines and penalties shall be deposited into a special account under the 17 Office of the Mayor of Tinian and Aguiguan to support the Municipality's Recycling 18 Program. The expenditure authority shall be the Mayor of Tinian and Aguiguan to ensure 19 the support and public education outreach for the program, to push forth the enforcement 20 purposes and other related programs under this Act. 21

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§ 106. Promulgation of Rules and Regulations.

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In consultation with the Bureau of Environmental and Coastal Quality, Resident Department Head of the Department of Commerce-Tinian and the Office of the Mayor of 24 Tinian and Aguiguan, the CNMI Department of Commerce shall promulgate rules and 25 regulations for the enforcement of this Act in line with the Tinian Waste Exclusion Plan 26 27 and the Municipality's Recycling Program."

Section 4. <u>Severability</u>. If any provisions of this Act or the application of any such
 provision to any person or circumstance should be held invalid by a court of competent
 jurisdiction, the remainder of this Act or the application of its provisions to persons or
 circumstances other than those to which it is held invalid shall not be affected thereby.

5 Section 5. <u>Savings Clause</u>. This Act and any repealer contained herein shall not 6 be construed as affecting any existing right acquired under contract or acquired under 7 statutes repealed or under any rule, regulation or order adopted under the statutes. 8 Repealers contained in this Act shall not affect any proceeding instituted under or pursuant 9 to prior law. The enactment of this Act shall not have the effect of terminating, or in any 10 way modifying, any liability civil or criminal, which shall already be in existence at the 11 date this Act becomes effective.

Section 5. <u>Effective Date</u>. This Act shall take effect upon its approval by the
 Governor or upon its becoming law without such approval.
