In addition, the Office is responsible for improving and coordinating the management of the Commonwealth Government. In this regard, the Special Assistant ensures discipline in government programs and activities for consistency with the Governor's policies and budget, improve government efficiency by reducing duplication and overlaps between and among agencies, and assist department and activity heads in internal organization and management to achieve maximum effectiveness at minimum cost to the taxpayers.

BUDGET PROCESS

1. BUDGET CALL

Upon receiving revenue projections from the Secretary of Finance, the administration establishes budget ceiling for the proposed fiscal year. SAMB transmits budget call letter to agencies, departments and other programs in January.





2. BUDGET SUBMISSION

Agencies, departments, and other programs submit desired budgets by mid-end February.

3. BUDGET FORMULATION

OMB analysts analyze desired budget considering appropriate measures to stay within budget calling for a balance budget.





4. BUDGET REVIEW

SAMB meets with expenditure authorities and assigned OMB analyst to discuss formulated budget and determine if necessary priority based budget changes are needed.

5. BUDGET FINALIZATION



SAMB meets with Governor and Lt. Governor to finalize budget, focusing on priority based budget



6. BUDGET PROPOSAL TRANSMITTAL

Analysts make necessary changes to balance the proposed fiscal year budget. Mayors' council meets to review and approve the proposed budget document. OMB meets April 1st deadline and submits proposed budget to the legislature.

7. BUDGET DELIBERATION

House Ways and Means and Senate Fiscal Affairs committees deliberate on the proposed fiscal year budget until it's enactment.





8. BUDGET EXECUTION

After both committees reach an agreement, it is transmitted as House Bill/Senate Bill for the Administration's approval. The Administration reviews and makes comments to the appropriation measure, Governor then signs it into Budget Law.

9. BUDGET ALLOCATION

OMB analysts allots budget appropriation according to the Budget Law.





10. BUDGET UPDATES

OMB analysts make regular updates to the budget by verifying position allocations that fall within the approved personnel ceiling and budget authority: satisfy request of expenditure authorities by preparing personnel projections and reprogramming when necessary.



4 FUTURE OUTLOOK

Challenges and Accomplishments

Challenges

- FY 2023 Budget preparation, appropriating two types of funding (General Fund and ARPA) based on priority, allowable costs, and restrictions.
- Migrating into the new financial management system, Tyler Munis.
- Ensuring that personnel allocations remain within the baselines of General Fund and ARPA.
- FY 2024 Budget preparation will be a challenge with Tyler Munis not fully integrated and 100% live.

Accomplishments

- Completed Fiscal Years 2020, 2021, 2022, & 2023 Governor's
 Proposed Budget using OMB's acquired budget software, Questica.
 Questica Budget Software is designed to streamline the budgeting
 process (planning, management, reporting, and sharing)
 for public sector entities.
- Besides our normal duties, OMB continues to support multiple programs (Public Assistance and Hazard Mitigation) as a result of the natural disasters (Soudelor, Mangkhut & Yutu, COVID-19).
- Certified and released 100+ Personnel Actions under the Governor's Covid-19 taskforce to assist in our COVID-19 protocols, safety, emergency, and preventative care services in the community and inbound/out-bound flights.
- In collaboration with Department of Finance, we have eliminated the routing process of departments' reprogramming requests, which allows departments to be hands-on and proactive in Tyler Munis, which is then release into workflow where OMB reviews, approves, and posts funding.
- To track our performance measures, we created a daily log for all incoming requests. This tool used by OMB helps us to track documents that we received, when they were processed and when and who picked up the documents. OMB's main goal is to ensure all requests submitted are processed within three days.
