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**A BILL FOR AN ACT**

To make appropriations for the operations and activities of the Government of the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, its agencies, instrumentalities, and independent programs, and to provide budget authority for government corporations for Fiscal Year 2021; and for other purposes.

**BE IT ENACTED BY THE 21ST NORTHERN MARIANAS  
COMMONWEALTH LEGISLATURE:**

1 **CHAPTER 1. PRELIMINARY PROVISIONS.**

2 **Section 101. Short Title.**

3 This Act may be cited as the “Appropriations and Budget Authority  
4 Act of 2021”.

5 **Section 102. Purpose.**

6 This Act appropriates local funds for the operations and activities of the  
7 Government of the Northern Mariana Islands, its agencies, instrumentalities,  
8 independent agencies and political subdivisions, and provides authority for  
9 government corporations for Fiscal Year 2021 commencing October 1, 2020 and  
10 ending September 30, 2021.

9 (e) “Operations” means appropriations for all lawful activities other than  
10 personnel.

11 (f) “Personnel” means appropriations for salaries, employer’s contribution  
12 to the Northern Marianas Retirement Fund, the Defined Contribution Plan,  
13 overtime, night differential, hazardous pay and other employee wages and benefits.

14 (g) “Number of Positions”(NOP) means the maximum number of persons  
15 that may be employed, pursuant to Article X, Section 7 of the Commonwealth  
16 Constitution but does not include Workforce Investment Agency, substitute  
17 teachers, summer trainees, teacher aides, physicians, licensed professional nurses  
18 and licensed allied health providers working part-time and paid only for  
19 instructional time, student teacher trainees, or short term specialized instructors,  
20 such as visiting artists, performers, writers, and the like. For purposes of this  
21 exception, “part-time” means employment not exceeding 40 hours in any biweekly

1 pay period, and “short-term” means not more than 90 instructional days  
2 employment within the Public School System during the fiscal year.

20 **Section 202. Suspension of Earmarked Funds.**

1 Except for debt service obligations and other earmarking of funds as  
2 permitted in Section 201 of this Chapter, the earmarking, reservation, commitment,  
3 allotment, or allocation of funds pursuant to the following public laws are hereby  
4 suspended for Fiscal Year 2021:

1           **Section 203. Reporting Requirements for the Secretary of Finance.**

2           (a) Comparison of Actual Revenues Collected and Revenues Estimated.

3   Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the Secretary of Finance shall submit to  
4   the Presiding Officers of the Legislature, Chairperson of the Senate Committee on  
5   Fiscal Affairs and the Chairperson of the House Committee Ways and Means, at the  
6   end of each quarter, a fund status report comparing the actual revenues collected and  
7   the revenues estimated of all funds appropriated for the operations and activities of  
8   the Commonwealth Government in this Act. The Secretary of Finance shall meet  
9   with the Chairperson of the Senate Committee on Fiscal Affairs and the Chairperson  
10   of the House Committee Ways and Means in mid-February, mid-May and mid-  
11   August to discuss actual revenues collected versus the revenues estimated.

12           (b) Comparison of Actual Expenditures and Appropriated Expenditures.

13   Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the Secretary of Finance shall submit to  
14   the Presiding Officers of the Legislature, Chairperson of the Senate Committee on  
15   Fiscal Affairs and the Chairperson of the House Committee Ways and Means, at the  
16   end of each quarter, a fund status report comparing the actual expenditures and  
17   appropriated expenditures of all funds appropriated for the operations and activities  
18   of the Commonwealth Government in this Act.

19           (c) Transfer In and Out Funds. Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the

20   Secretary of Finance shall submit to the presiding officers of the Legislature, at the

1 end of each quarter, a fund status report on the funds transferred in and out each  
2 quarter pursuant to Section 201 of this Act.

3 **CHAPTER III.**

4 **GOVERNMENT CORPORATIONS AND DESIGNATED**

5 **AGENCIES/ACTIVITIES**

6 **Section 301. Appropriation and Budget Authority.**

7 Pursuant to 1 CMC § 7206 and as provided herein, budget and expenditure  
8 authority for the following activities is hereby approved. Expenditures in excess of  
9 the budget authority approved herein for agencies to which public funds are  
10 appropriated shall not be incurred or committed and hiring in excess of the number  
11 of positions authorized by this Act is prohibited, unless authorized by a legislative  
12 joint resolution in accordance with Section 7, Article X of the N.M.I. Constitution.

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1           (a) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, in lieu of the hotel occupancy  
2 tax earmarked funds, the Marianas Visitors Authority's budget allocation for its  
3 personnel and operations/all others expenses shall be appropriated as set forth in  
4 Schedule A of this Act.

5           (b) Notwithstanding the above dollar amounts, the entities above shall  
6 expend only the lesser of funds actually generated, collected or received, or the  
7 amounts indicated above.

8           **Section 302. Prior Certification of Funds.**

9           No contract shall be entered into with the Commonwealth or any  
10 government entity therein without first receiving from the Secretary of the  
11 Department of Finance certification that lawful and sufficient funds have been  
12 appropriated. This section shall not apply to the Public School System and the  
13 Northern Marianas College.

14           **Section 303. Reporting Requirement.**

15           The expenditure authorities of the foregoing activities listed in Section 301  
16 shall submit to the Presiding Officers of the Legislature, at the end of each quarter,  
17 a fund status report on the expenditures for personnel and operations of each  
18 government entity, and the payments of the public auditor's fee, for the quarter  
19 ended and, if applicable, year-to-date totals as of the close of the reporting period.

20           Furthermore, notwithstanding any provisions or laws to the contrary, all  
21 additional resources realized within the fiscal year outside of those specified and

1 identified under this Act shall be reported in detail to the Legislature for  
2 appropriation purposes.

3 **CHAPTER IV. ADMINISTRATION OF APPROPRIATED FUNDS**

4 **Section 401. Management of Funds.**

5 The expenditure of the funds appropriated and allocated under this Act shall  
6 be regulated and controlled by the Secretary of Finance so that no agency,  
7 department, instrumentality, program, or activity may expend the funds contrary to  
8 the law or fiscal management policies and practices of the Commonwealth.  
9 Provided further that, in addition to the report required under 1 CMC §7209, the  
10 Secretary of Finance shall submit within 30 calendar days at the end of each quarter,  
11 a fund status report on the expenditures for personnel and operations of each  
12 business unit funded in whole or in part by the General Fund for the quarter ended  
13 and, if applicable, year-to-date totals as of the close of the reporting period.

14 **Section 402. Number of Position(s) (NOP) Ceiling.**

15 Employment Ceilings. Pursuant to Article X, § 7 of the Commonwealth  
16 Constitution, the employment ceilings relative to the number of positions are  
17 hereby established as set forth in this Act.

18 **Section 403. Expenditure Authority.**

19 The distribution and expenditure of funds shall be in compliance with the  
20 fiscal expenditure authority that the listed agencies have pursuant to statute and the  
21 administrative provisions of this Act.

1           **Section 404. Reduction of Budget Authority.**

2           Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, whenever the Secretary of the  
3 Department of Finance determines with reasonable certainty that the actual  
4 revenues which the Commonwealth will receive during fiscal year 2021 will  
5 decrease by more than \$200,000 or by more than three percent from the revenue  
6 estimates in House Concurrent Resolution No. 21-02, SS1, the Secretary shall  
7 mandate an immediate prospective proportionate reduction in the allotment  
8 authority of all branches, offices, departments, agencies, and instrumentalities of  
9 the Commonwealth which are subject to appropriations. The prospective  
10 proportionate reduction shall be applied to the remaining period of the fiscal year  
11 and shall commence upon receipt of the Governor's special message to the  
12 presiding officers of the legislature mandating a reduction up to the remainder of  
13 the fiscal year.

14                           **CHAPTER V. REPROGRAMMING AUTHORITY**

15           **Section 501. Reprogramming Authority**

16           (a) Authority to reprogram appropriated funds shall be as provided under  
17 1 CMC §7402, unless otherwise specified in this Act. Provided further,  
18 notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, that prior to exercising  
19 reprogramming authority, for the Executive Branch, under Section 501 of this Act,  
20 1 CMC §7402, or otherwise, the Governor shall provide written notice and a  
21 detailed breakdown of the reprogramming of funds of not less than 15 calendar

1 days to the Presiding Officers of the Legislature. The Governor shall have unlimited  
2 authority to reprogram funds for fiscal year 2021 solely within the executive  
3 branch, but not including the legislative branch, the judicial branch, the  
4 instrumentalities and autonomous agencies.

5 (b) Pursuant to 1 CMC § 7402(e), all reprogramming shall be reported in  
6 writing to the Presiding Officers of the Legislature, Chairperson of the House  
7 Committee on Ways and Means and the Chairperson of the Senate Committee on  
8 Fiscal Affairs within 30 days after the end of each quarter of the fiscal year. Such  
9 reports shall include a description of each item reprogrammed, the reason for each  
10 reprogramming, the change in the approved budget caused by the reprogramming,  
11 the cumulative amount of all reprogramming during the fiscal year, and such other  
12 information as may be requested by the Chairpersons. The Governor shall submit  
13 to the Presiding Officers and Chairpersons an annual summary of all  
14 reprogramming activity within 60 days after the end of a fiscal year.

15 **CHAPTER VI. SUPPLEMENTAL ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS**

16 **Section 601. Utilities.**

17 The amount appropriated for the payment of utilities shall not be  
18 reprogrammed, nor shall other appropriations be reprogrammed for the payment of  
19 utilities, except for the purpose of covering increased utility costs due to rate  
20 increases. ~~Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, funds that are~~  
21 ~~appropriated by this Act or any subsequent amendments shall not be used or~~

1 ~~reprogrammed to pay for the utilities of any elected officials, including but not~~  
2 ~~limited to any utility expenses incurred at a private or official residence. For~~  
3 ~~purposes of this section, “utilities” does not include the expenses of elected officials~~  
4 ~~incurred by reason of traveling or working on official business outside their~~  
5 ~~respective home senatorial district.~~

6           **Section 602. Hiring Restriction.**

7           (a) No new or vacant position shall be filled in the executive branch, except  
8 for positions which are essential for the delivery of public services as determined  
9 by the Governor. Provided, however, that should a need arise for an essential  
10 position, employees who have been furloughed shall have first priority. The  
11 Governor shall approve the filling of new and vacant position prior to the  
12 announcement of the position.

13           (b) Notwithstanding any law or regulation to the contrary, any position that  
14 becomes vacant after March 15, 2021 shall be blocked if it is not filled within 45  
15 days. Provided however, (1) if a Notice of Personnel Action has been executed by  
16 the hiring agency and a candidate to fill the vacancy has been selected or (2) an  
17 action has been initiated to fill the position by any department or agency and filed  
18 at the Office of Personnel Management in Rota, Tinian, and Saipan prior to the  
19 expiration of the 45 day requirement, the vacant position(s) shall be deemed in  
20 conformance within the 45 day requirement. The renewal of the contract for an  
21 existing employee shall not be considered creating a vacant position. Any

1 unencumbered funds realized as a result of position vacancies shall lapse and be  
2 applied to the general fund deficit reduction – business unit 1595.

3 **Section 603. Public Auditor’s Fee.**

4 (a) Notwithstanding other provisions of law, for FY 2021 this Act mandates  
5 that all public corporations and autonomous government agencies pay the 1%  
6 Public Auditor’s Fee except for the Public School System, the Northern Marianas  
7 College, the Northern Marianas Technical Institute, and the Commonwealth Ports  
8 Authority. Provided that if services are rendered by the Office of the Public Auditor  
9 to the Public School System, the Northern Marianas College, the Northern  
10 Marianas Technical Institute, the Commonwealth Ports Authority, and the  
11 Commonwealth Utilities Corporation during the fiscal year, the Public Auditor may  
12 charge a service fee to the said agencies. The Secretary of Finance shall collect and  
13 withhold this fee and deposit the amounts in a special account established by the  
14 Secretary of Finance, separate from the General Fund, to be managed and  
15 distributed according to law by the Public Auditor. The Secretary of Finance may  
16 work with the Attorney General to implement this provision and enforce  
17 collection.

18 (b) Notwithstanding 1 CMC §7831, any remaining unencumbered balance  
19 at the end of the fiscal year of the Public Auditor's Fee of 1% (one percent) of the  
20 total appropriations for each government agency's operations and activities, and

1 public corporation and autonomous government agencies shall lapse and be applied  
2 to the general fund deficit reduction – business unit 1595.

3 **Section 604. Salary Limitations Caps.**

4 (a) No annual salary of any government employee within the executive  
5 branch shall be increased during the fiscal year without the approval of the  
6 governor.

7 (b) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the director of the Office of  
8 Personnel Management shall not receive an annual salary of more than \$54,000.00.

9 ~~The salaries for the following appointed officials shall revert back to the~~  
10 ~~salaries or its equivalent, prescribed in Public Law 7 31, less 20%, if applicable,~~  
11 ~~based on the Governor’s revised allocation for FY 2021 as set forth in the attached~~  
12 ~~Schedule B. Furthermore, no employee shall receive a retroactive salary~~  
13 ~~adjustment.~~

14 **Section 605. Austerity Mondays.**

15 Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, Mondays are hereby designated  
16 as “austerity days” for the CNMI government, its branches, departments,  
17 autonomous agencies, public corporations, political subdivisions and  
18 instrumentalities that elect to implement austerity days as necessary to operate  
19 within their respective budget allocations. This section does not apply to partial or  
20 fully federally funded government employees. This section does not apply to the  
21 Legislature, the Municipal Councils and the Board of Education on Monday,

1 January 11, 2021 for the purpose of conducting their respective organizational  
2 meeting or inauguration. For purposes of this section, “austerity days” are days  
3 when CNMI government offices are closed due to budget shortfall reasons. Due to  
4 the time difference between the CNMI and the US mainland, it would be more  
5 conducive for government employees to work on Fridays instead of Mondays  
6 because the federal government is closed on Mondays in the CNMI.

7 **CHAPTER VII. APPROPRIATIONS.**

8 **Section 700. In General.**

9 (a) Funds designated in Chapter II as available for appropriation for FY  
10 2021 are hereby appropriated pursuant to this Chapter; and

11 (b) Pursuant to Art. X, Sec.7 of the N.M.I. Constitution, no business unit’s  
12 maximum number of positions shall exceed the authorized number of positions  
13 established in this Chapter, unless authorized by a joint resolution of the legislature.

14 **Section 701. Appropriation.**

15 The amount of ~~\$87,212,977~~ \$101,032,218 is hereby appropriated as set  
16 forth in the attached Schedule A which is inclusive of the Department of Public  
17 Lands.

18 **Section 702. Judicial Branch.**

19 (a) The Number of Personnel and appropriations for personnel, operations,  
20 and utilities for the Judicial Branch shall be as shown in Schedule A.

1 (b) Notwithstanding 1 CMC §7204, without prior legislative approval, no  
2 funds appropriated to the Judicial Branch shall be reduced. The Chief Justice shall  
3 be the expenditure authority for the Judicial Branch.

4 ~~(e) Funds appropriated for FY 2021 to the Judicial Branch shall be allotted~~  
5 ~~quarterly pursuant to 1 CMC §7204 (e).~~

6 **Section 703. Legislative Branch.**

7 The Number of Personnel and appropriations for personnel, operations, and  
8 utilities for the Legislative Branch shall be as shown in Schedule A.

9 (a) Notwithstanding 1 CMC §7204, without prior legislative approval, no  
10 funds appropriated to the Legislature shall be reduced.

11 (b) Art. II Sec. 16(e) of the Commonwealth Constitution provides:

12 e) Beginning the second Monday of January 1998, the amount of the  
13 ceiling and all other dollar amounts stated in this section shall be  
14 adjusted every two years by the same percentage as the percentage  
15 change in the United States Department of Commerce composite  
16 price index during the two preceding fiscal years using the  
17 beginning of fiscal year 1996 as the base. [The beginning of fiscal  
18 year 1996 would be Oct. 1, 1995]

19 The appropriation ceilings have automatically increased every two years,  
20 beginning January 1998. Using the price composite indexes developed by the  
21 Department of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analysis for State and Local

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1 Government Consumption Expenditures and Gross Investment, the appropriation  
2 ceilings for the Legislature for fiscal years 2020 and 2021 is as follows:

12 (c) Funds appropriated for FY2021 to the Legislative Branch shall be  
13 allotted quarterly pursuant to 1 CMC §7204 (e).

14 (d) Salaries of Legislative Members.

15 (1) The amount appropriated under this section to the House of  
16 Representatives under “personnel” shall be used to fund the salaries and benefits of  
17 the members of the House of Representatives. The expenditure authority for the  
18 amounts appropriated shall be the Speaker of the House.

19 (2) The amount appropriated under this section to the Senate under  
20 “personnel” shall be used to fund the salaries and benefits of the members of the  
21 Senate. The expenditure authority for the amounts appropriated shall be the President  
22 of the Senate.

23 (e) Members’ Office Accounts, Allowances and Employees.

24 (1) Notwithstanding 1 CMC §7401(c) to the contrary, each member shall be  
25 the expenditure authority of the funds allocated to their individual sub-account;

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1           (2) Funds allocated for the operation of the member’s office, including, but  
2 not limited to, the personnel costs of the member’s employees and expenditures as  
3 authorized by the adopted rules of the Senate in the case of the Senate member, or  
4 the adopted rules of the House of Representatives in the case of a House member, or  
5 the Legislative Bureau, may be expended to defray travel and incidental expenses for  
6 the purpose of attending to legislative business; ~~provided that a member may receive~~  
7 ~~a one month advancement of funds allocated to his or her office for expenditures;~~

8           (3) Allocation of the maximum number of positions among House members  
9 shall be governed by the rules of the House; and

10          (4) Allocation of the maximum number of positions among Senate members  
11 shall be governed by the rules of the Senate.

12          (f) Senate and House Leadership Accounts. The leadership account of each  
13 house shall be \$300,000 ~~\$143,722~~. The presiding officer of each respective house, or  
14 his lawfully authorized designee, shall be the expenditure authority and shall use such  
15 funds to support the operations and activities of the House of Representatives and  
16 Senate in accordance with its rules, provided that the presiding officer distributes a  
17 portion of the total appropriation in equal amounts to all the standing committees for  
18 their operations and activities.

19          (g) Legislative Bureau, BU 1770. The Number of Personnel and  
20 appropriations for personnel, operations, and utilities for the Legislative Bureau  
21 shall be as shown in Schedule A.

1           (1) The expenditure authority of the funds appropriated for the Legislative  
2 Bureau shall be the Director of the Legislative Bureau or his or her lawfully  
3 authorized designee.

4           (h) Northern Marianas Youth Congress, BU 1593. The Number of  
5 Personnel and appropriations for personnel and operations for Youth Congress shall  
6 be as shown in Schedule A.

7           (1) The expenditure authority is vested in the Director of the Legislative  
8 Bureau with the consent of the Speaker of the Northern Mariana Islands Youth  
9 Congress.

10           **Section 704. Executive Branch.**

11           The appropriation for the Executive Branch shall be as shown in Schedule  
12 A.

13           (a) Except as provided in this section, the Governor shall have authority to  
14 expend, obligate, encumber, otherwise commit, all the funds appropriated to the  
15 Office of the Governor and all Other Offices of the Governor.

16           (b) The Lt. Governor shall be the expenditure authority of the funds  
17 appropriated to the Office of the Lt. Governor.

18           **Section 705. First Senatorial District – Rota.**

19           The Number of Personnel and appropriations for personnel, operations, and  
20 utilities for the First Senatorial District shall be as shown in Schedule A.

1           (a) Except as provided in this section, the Mayor of Rota shall have  
2 authority to expend, obligate, encumber, and otherwise commit, all the funds  
3 appropriated to the First Senatorial District. Appropriations to the Municipal  
4 Council shall be divided and distributed equally to each member of the Municipal  
5 Council in separate accounts. Each Municipal Council member shall be the  
6 expenditure authority of funds distributed to him/her. Additionally, except as  
7 provided in this section, in accord with the Superior Court’s decision in the case of  
8 *Inos v. Tenorio*, the Mayors shall also have expenditure authority over resident  
9 government departments in the First and Second Senatorial districts respectively  
10 unless the Governor revokes expenditure authority in a manner consistent with the  
11 Superior Court’s holding in *Inos v. Tenorio*, to wit: expenditure authority over  
12 resident departments that are primarily concerned with the delivery of public  
13 services can be revoked only on a prior showing of just cause, but the Governor has  
14 discretion to revoke expenditure authority over those departments that are primarily  
15 concerned with enforcing the law.

16           (b) Any shortfall in the funds from the funds appropriated as a result or due  
17 to payment of overtime, retirement, or benefits shall be borne by the municipality.

18           **Section 706. Second Senatorial District – Tinian & Aguiguan.**

19           The Number of Personnel and appropriations for personnel, operations, and  
20 utilities for the Second Senatorial District shall be as shown in Schedule A.

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1           (a) Except as provided in this section, Mayor of Tinian and Aguiguan shall  
2 have authority to expend, obligate, encumber, otherwise commit or reprogram, all  
3 the funds appropriated to the Second Senatorial District. Appropriations to the  
4 Municipal Council shall be divided and distributed equally to each member of the  
5 Municipal Council in separate accounts. ~~Each~~ The Municipal Council Chairperson  
6 ~~member~~ shall be the expenditure authority of funds distributed to the Municipal  
7 Council ~~him/her~~. Additionally, in accord with the Superior Court’s decision in the  
8 case of *Inos v. Tenorio*, the Mayors shall also have expenditure authority over  
9 resident government departments in the First and Second senatorial districts  
10 respectively unless the Governor revokes expenditure authority in a manner  
11 consistent with the Superior Court’s holding in *Inos v. Tenorio*, to wit: expenditure  
12 authority over resident departments that are primarily concerned with the delivery  
13 of public services can be revoked only on a prior showing of just cause, but the  
14 Governor has discretion to revoke expenditure authority over those departments  
15 that are primarily concerned with enforcing the law.

16           **(b) Notwithstanding any laws to the contrary, there is established one NOP**  
17 **for the Tinian Department of Public Works for a certified civil engineer with a**  
18 **salary of \$70,000 which shall be funded by the developer’s infrastructure tax for**  
19 **the Second Senatorial District – business unit 3731.**

1           (c) Notwithstanding any laws to the contrary, there is established one NOP  
2 for the Department of Lands and Natural Resources, Division of Fish and Wildlife  
3 for a biologist for the municipality of Tinian & Aguiguan.

4           (d) Any shortfall in the funds from the funds appropriated as a result or due  
5 to payment of overtime, retirement, or benefits shall be borne by the municipality.

6           **Section 707. Third Senatorial District – Mayor of Saipan; Mayor of the**  
7 **Northern Islands; and Saipan and Northern Islands Municipal Council.**

8           The Number of Personnel and appropriations for personnel, operations, and  
9 utilities for the Office of the Mayor of Saipan, Office of the Mayor of the Northern  
10 Islands, and the Saipan and Northern Islands Municipal Council shall be as shown  
11 in Schedule A.

12           The Mayor of Saipan, the Mayor of the Northern Islands, and the  
13 Chairperson of the Municipal Council for Saipan and the Northern Islands or each  
14 of their respective designees shall be the expenditure authority for appropriations  
15 for their respective offices.

16           **Section 708. Boards and Commissions.**

17           The FY 2021 appropriation for the programs under this section shall be as  
18 shown in Schedule A.

19           **Section 709. Other Programs.**

20           The FY 2021 appropriation for the programs under this section shall be as  
21 shown in Schedule A.

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1           (a) Northern Marianas College. The President of the Northern Marianas  
2 College or his/her designee shall be the expenditure authority of the appropriated  
3 funds under business unit 1605.

4           **(b) NMC Board of Regents. The Chairperson of the Board of Regents of**  
5 **the Northern Marianas College or his/her designee shall be the expenditure**  
6 **authority of the appropriated funds under business unit 1627.**

7           (c) Public School System. The Commissioner of Education or his/her  
8 designee shall be the expenditure authority of the appropriated funds under BU  
9 1607. Funds allocated to PSS shall not be used for personnel and operations of the  
10 Board of Education. Of the funds appropriated to the Public School System,  
11 \$50,000 shall be allocated to the Chamorro Carolinian Language Heritage Studies  
12 program for the development of the digital literacy resources and printing.

13           (d) Board of Education. The Chairperson of the Board of Education or  
14 his/her designee shall be the expenditure authority of the appropriated funds under  
15 business unit 1624. The funds appropriated to the Board of Education shall include  
16 the cost and expenses of the student and teacher representatives to the Board of  
17 Education.

18           **(e) Northern Marianas Technical Institute. The Chairperson of the Board of**  
19 **Trustees or his/her designee in consultation with the Chief Executive Officer shall**  
20 **be the expenditure authority of the appropriated funds for the Northern Marianas**  
21 **Technical Institute.**

1           **Section 710. Independent Programs.**

2           The FY 2021 budget appropriation for the agencies under this section shall  
3 be as shown in Schedule A.

4           (a) Joeten-Kiyu Public Library. The Chairperson of the Commonwealth  
5 Library Council or his/her designee shall be the expenditure authority of the  
6 appropriated funds.

7           (b) NMI Museum of History and Culture. The Chairperson of the Board of  
8 Governors of the NMI Museum of History and Culture or his/her designee shall be  
9 the expenditure authority of the appropriated funds.

10          (c) Elected Attorney General. The Attorney General or his/her designee  
11 shall be the expenditure authority of the appropriated funds. Notwithstanding any  
12 law to the contrary, the Office of the Attorney General may charge fees for legal  
13 services provided to CNMI public corporations, autonomous agencies, the  
14 Department of Public Lands, the Division of Revenue and Taxation, the Bureau of  
15 Coastal and Environmental Quality, and the Office of Management and Budget;  
16 provided that the Office of the Attorney General shall not charge fees for legal  
17 services provided to divisions, offices, and line agencies within the executive  
18 branch.

19          (d) Group Health and Life Insurance. ~~The funds earmarked to the Group~~  
20 ~~Health and Life Insurance pursuant to 4 CMC § 1402(a)(16) and funds appropriated~~  
21 to the Group Health Insurance under BU 1533 and GHLI Retirees under BU 1528

1 shall not be reprogrammed for any other purpose. Any lapsed funds shall be  
2 deposited into a non-lapsing account to be used to reduce the premium of the  
3 government group health insurance for active employees and retirees. Provided that  
4 25 percent past and current obligations of the central government for the death  
5 benefit of retirees shall first be satisfied.

6 (e) The expenditure authority of the funds appropriated for the Public  
7 Assistance Program shall be the Governor's Authorized Representative.

8 (f) Medicaid Program. The funds appropriated in this Act for the Medicaid  
9 Program, including Medicaid Reimbursement - business unit 1951, Medicaid  
10 Administration business unit - 1980, and the new business unit for Compliance and  
11 Medicaid Enterprise Systems (MES) shall be deemed a single budget reserved for  
12 the purposes of Medicaid Administration, Medicaid Reimbursement, and  
13 Compliance and Medicaid Enterprise Systems. The Director of the Commonwealth  
14 Medicaid Agency may reallocate the funds appropriated in this Act to any of the  
15 expenditure categories, including, but not limited to, Administration,  
16 Reimbursement, and Compliance and Medicaid Enterprise Systems.

17 (g) For programs and activities not specifically mentioned, the expenditure  
18 authority shall be the Secretary of Finance.

19 **Section 711. Department of Public Lands.**

20 Pursuant to 1 CMC §2803, \$4,556,164 is appropriated to the Department of  
21 Public Lands. Of the funds appropriated to the Department of Public Lands,

1 \$533,865 shall be made available for the completion of the Kastiyu Agricultural  
2 Homestead development in Tinian, the Kagman Farm Plots on Saipan, the Dugi &  
3 Gampapa Agricultural Homestead developments in Rota, and other agricultural  
4 homestead developments in the Northern Islands including surveying, designing  
5 and other expenses related to agricultural homestead developments, \$1,533,865 and  
6 \$1,000,000 shall be transferred to the Marianas Public Land Trust.

7 **Section 712. Reporting Requirements.**

8 (a) The expenditure authorities of the foregoing activities listed in Chapter  
9 VII shall submit to the presiding officers of the legislature, within 30 days after the  
10 end of each quarter, a fund status report on the expenditures for personnel and  
11 operations of each government entity, and the payments of the public auditor's fee,  
12 for the quarter ended and, if applicable, year-to-date totals as of the close of the  
13 reporting period. Failure to report on the expenditures of such funds by each  
14 respective government entity shall result in a suspension of their future allocations  
15 until the delayed quarterly report has been submitted to the presiding officers of the  
16 legislature.

17 (b) Commonwealth Health Care Corporation Report. Not later than 180  
18 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Chief Executive Officer of the  
19 Commonwealth Health Care Corporation shall submit to the Speaker of the House  
20 of Representatives and the President of the Senate a report on the feasibility of a  
21 Universal Health Insurance model in the Commonwealth. No fewer than three

1 scenarios shall be presented in the final report. The CEO may contract with a  
2 qualified vendor to conduct the feasibility study, which shall include but not be  
3 limited to, the following activities:

4 (1) Stakeholder consultations to formulate appropriate assumptions for the  
5 actuarial model, including but not limited to: perceived risks and benefits of  
6 participating in the Universal Health Insurance program as members; desire to  
7 participate in the program; voluntary versus mandatory contributions; willingness  
8 to contribute, contribution rates, and appropriate ceiling on contribution rates;  
9 claims data submitted to the CNMI Department of Commerce in accordance with  
10 4 CMC §7301(d)(2); opportunities for employer participation; and legal, quality,  
11 and capacity barriers faced by the Commonwealth. These consultations shall also  
12 examine opportunities to coordinate a Universal Health Insurance program with the  
13 CNMI Medicaid program and CNMI Medical Referral to eliminate coverage and  
14 eligibility gaps between the programs.

15 (2) Actuarial analyses of the proposed program to calculate the expected  
16 costs and revenues of the Universal Health Insurance plan, including but not limited  
17 to: utilization rates, age and gender ~~sex~~ mix of enrollees, and costs of medical  
18 services.

19 (c) Access provided to Legislative Analysts.

20 (1) Provided further, notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary,  
21 training and access to:

1 (A) the JD Edwards system or other financial and accounting system to  
2 obtain the following: monthly collections and expenditures, including but not  
3 limited to funds status, and detailed expenditure reports in a format that is  
4 exportable or convertible to Excel files; and

5 (B) the following reports in a format that is exportable or convertible to  
6 Excel files shall be provided to the CNMI Legislature Fiscal Analysts 30 days after  
7 the effective date of this Act:

8 (i) All revolving accounts;

9 (ii) All business activities listed in Schedule A;

10 (iii) All accounts listed as earmarks in the Budget Authority Act;

11 (iv) All debt service payments, including payments to the Settlement Fund,  
12 and Series A and Series B Funds;

13 (v) All revenue accounts in the First, Second, and Third Senatorial Districts  
14 that are identified as budgetary resources in the Budget Authority Act;

15 (C) Any other financial information, not legally privileged or protected,  
16 relating to the CNMI Government's expenditure of public funds, as needed and  
17 requested, in writing, within 10 days of said request.

18 **Section 713. Violations of Spending Limits.**

19 (a) The expenditure of funds in excess of appropriations and reprogramming  
20 established by this Act is a violation of the Planning and Budget Act,  
21 1 CMC § 7101 et. seq. Any government employee violating The Planning and

1 Budget Act shall not be entitled to indemnification, defense or reimbursement  
2 under the Government Liability Act or any other Commonwealth Law. Provided  
3 further that should a violation occur, any over expenditure shall be deducted from  
4 the respective Department, Agency and/or Branch in the next fiscal year  
5 Appropriations Act and reflected in its total annual appropriations.

6 **CHAPTER VIII. OUTSIDE SOURCES**

7 **Section 801. Administrative Provisions.**

8 (a) The following amounts from sources outside the General Fund are  
9 available for appropriation.

10 (b) Notwithstanding 1 CMC §7204, the outside source funds appropriated  
11 for FY 2021 shall be allotted monthly; except programs that require one-time  
12 payments may receive advance allotments.

13 (c) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the Secretary of Finance shall  
14 submit to the presiding officers of the Legislature, at the end of each quarter, a fund  
15 status report on the outside source funds transferred in and out each quarter pursuant  
16 to Section 802 of this Act.

17 **Section 802. Outside Sources.**

18 (a) Tobacco Settlement Funds. Pursuant to 3 CMC § 2173, and provided  
19 that the funds allocated in this section pursuant to the submittal of program and  
20 expenditure plan to the Secretary of Finance, the Tobacco Settlement funds in the

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1 amount of \$460,000.00, not subject to reprogramming or fiscal year limitation, shall  
2 be allocated as follows:

- 3 (1) Division of Public Health 40%: \$184,000.00
- 4 (2) Public School System 20%: \$92,000.00
- 5 (3) Youth Affairs Office 12.5%: \$57,500.00
- 6 (4) Coalition of Private Schools 7.5%: \$34,500.00
- 7 (5) Rota Mayor 10%: \$46,000.00
- 8 (6) Tinian and Aguiguan Mayor 10%: \$46,000.00

9 The expenditure authorities of the funds allocated pursuant to this section  
10 shall be the persons authorized by law for each respective office or agency. The  
11 expenditure authorities shall provide accountability and transparency by providing  
12 within 30 days after the end of each quarter an expenditure report of the funds to  
13 the governor and the presiding officers of the Legislature.

14 (b) **Compact Impact.** The Compact Impact fund in the amount of  
15 \$750,000.00 is allocated as follows:

6           Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the NMC President shall be the  
7 expenditure authority of the funds herein. The funds allocated under this subsection  
8 shall not be reprogrammed for any other purpose and shall be used pursuant to the  
9 submitted original expenditure plan. The funds allocated under this subsection are  
10 not subject to fiscal year limitation.

11           In the event that additional Compact Impact funds become available for the  
12 CNMI during the fiscal year, the funds shall be distributed to the agencies listed  
13 above from (1) through (11) except for the Northern Marianas College pursuant to  
14 the original expenditure plan.

15           **(c) Commonwealth Worker Fund** (Source: U.S.P.L. 115-218).

16           In accordance with U.S. Public Law 115-218, the sum of \$1,400,000.00 in  
17 Commonwealth Worker Fee Funds shall be available for the sole and exclusive  
18 purpose of funding vocational education, apprenticeships, or other training  
19 programs for United States workers by Commonwealth educational entities for FY  
20 2021. Provided that out of the \$1,400,000.00, the following amounts shall be  
21 allocated for the sole and exclusive purpose of funding vocational education,

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1 apprenticeships, or other vocational training programs for United States workers as  
2 follows:

3 (1) \$600,000.00 shall be transferred to the Northern Marianas  
4 Technical Institute (NMTI) for its vocational educational curricula,  
5 apprenticeships, or other training programs including the First and Second  
6 Senatorial Districts in consultation with the respective mayors; provided  
7 that \$50,000 shall be reserved each for the First and Second Senatorial  
8 District training programs. Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the  
9 Chairman of the NMTI Board of Trustees in consultation with the NMTI  
10 Chief Executive Officer, shall be the expenditure authority of the funds  
11 herein; and

12 (2) \$800,000.00 shall be transferred to the Northern Marianas  
13 College to fund vocational education, or other training programs. Provided  
14 that not less than \$50,000 of the funds allocated to NMC shall be used for  
15 the Nursing Program equipment and supplies. Notwithstanding any law to  
16 the contrary, the NMC President shall be the expenditure authority of the  
17 funds herein. The recipients of the funds in this subsection shall submit to  
18 the Governor and the Department of Labor the required education plans  
19 consistent with and mandated by U.S. Public Law 115-218. The funds  
20 allocated pursuant to this section shall not be used or reprogrammed for any

1           other purpose other than in accordance with U.S. Public Law 115-218. The  
2           funds allocated under this subsection are not subject to fiscal year limitation.  
3           The expenditure authorities of the funds allocated pursuant to this section  
4           shall provide accountability and transparency by providing within 30 days after the  
5           end of each quarter an expenditure report of the funds to the governor and the  
6           presiding officers of the Legislature.

7           **Section 803. CIQ Overtime Revolving Account.**

8           (a) Department of Finance. Notwithstanding any law or regulation to the  
9           contrary, the Secretary of the Department of Finance is authorized to transfer and  
10           expend the amount of \$3,205,461 from the CIQ Overtime Revolving Fund under  
11           business unit 9040 for its personnel and operations/utilities expenses for FY2021  
12           as set forth below:

24           (b) Medicaid Reimbursement. Notwithstanding any law or regulation to the  
25           contrary, the Secretary of the Department of Finance is authorized to transfer the

1 amount of \$3,300,000 from the CIQ Overtime Revolving Fund under business unit  
2 9040 to pay for the CNMI's Medicaid Reimbursement under business unit 1951.

3 **Section 804. Federal Cover Over Taxes.**

4 Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, any federal cover over taxes  
5 received by the CNMI government during the fiscal year shall be applied to the  
6 general fund deficit reduction – business unit 1595.

7 **CHAPTER IX. ADDITIONAL ADMINISTRATIVE PROVISIONS**

8 **Section 901. Solid Waste.**

9 Although the earmarked funds in accordance with P.L. 13-42 and P.L. 18-  
10 64 are suspended for the Fiscal Year 2021, funding the Solid Waste personnel for  
11 Rota, Tinian, and Saipan are still necessary. Accordingly, the Solid Waste  
12 personnel and operations cost for Rota, Tinian, Saipan shall be funded under  
13 Business Unit 2082.

14 **Section 902. Retirement 25% Pension Payments.**

15 (a) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the Governor is hereby  
16 authorized to reprogram funds solely within the executive branch business units to  
17 pay for the remaining 25% of the retirees' pension for FY 2021.

18 (b) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the Governor is hereby  
19 authorized to transfer, expend, or use available funds from the \$25M Bank of Guam  
20 CNMI Government Loan, any FEMA Reimbursement, the remaining casino gross

1 revenue taxes, and any other available funds to pay for the remaining 25% of the  
2 retirees' pension for FY 2021.

3 **CHAPTER XVIII. GENERAL PROVISIONS**

4 **Section 1001 ~~801~~. Severability.** If any provision of this Act, or its  
5 application to any person or circumstance, is held invalid, the invalidity does not  
6 affect other provisions or applications of the Act which can be given effect without  
7 the invalid provision or applications, and to this end the provisions of this Act are  
8 severable.

9 **Section 1002 ~~802~~. Savings Clause.** This Act and any repealer contained  
10 herein shall not be construed as affecting any existing right acquired under contract  
11 or acquired under statutes repealed or under any rule, regulation or order adopted  
12 under the statutes. Repealers contained in this Act shall not affect any proceeding  
13 instituted under or pursuant to prior law. The enactment of this Act shall not have  
14 the effect of terminating, or in any way modifying, any liability civil or criminal,  
15 which shall already be in existence at the date this Act becomes effective.

16 **Section 1003 ~~803~~. Effective Date.** This Act shall take effect upon its  
17 approval by the Governor, or its becoming law without such approval.
